Warden to refuse Czolgosz's body even to his relatives, and will give the Warden the privilege of disposing of it. In that event, within two hours after the execution, unless Dr. McDonald cares to make an analysis of the brain, Czolgosz's body will be buried in the street and the remains of the body of the assassin will be buried in quicklime and the letters and packages will be consumed by fire.

FATHER SENDS LAST WORD.
CLEVELAND, Ohio, Oct. 27.—The press is made the medium for the last message from the father of Leon Czolgosz, the condemned assassin who will pay the penalty for his terrible deed in Auburn prison Tuesday morning. In an interview this afternoon the elder Czolgosz was asked what he had to say finally to his unfortunate son. The old man's eyes filled with tears as he replied sobberly:

ASK GOVERNOR OF TEXAS FOR AID OF THE RANGERS

NACOGDOCHES, Tex., Oct. 27.—County Judge McDonald of San Augustine County has appealed to the Governor for Rangers on account of intelligence that about eighty members of the Wall faction had assembled at Tobe, Sabine County, and were making preparations to march on San Augustine for the purpose of avenging the death of the six Walls who have been killed on the borders. The telephone lines have been cut, and no news is being had. The excitement is throughout this section, and a number of heavily armed men have passed here today on route to the scene.

RANCHER OF MONTANA MURDERS A NEIGHBOR
Surrenders to the Sheriff and Claims That He Acted in Self-Defense.
HELENA, Mont., Oct. 27.—A special to the Independent from Townsend, Mont., says Ben Kimber, a well-known rancher who lives nine miles below Townsend, came in from his ranch today and gave himself up to Sheriff Poole, saying that in self-defense he had shot and killed a neighboring rancher named Jacob G. Timager. Kimber was locked up. According to the story told by Kimber, he and Timager have been having trouble for some time in consequence of the latter's attempts to fence off a road leading to Kimber's ranch. Yesterday afternoon a quarrel ensued, which ended in Kimber emptying two loads of buckshot into the breast of his neighbor.

TO BE TRIED FOR DUELING.
ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 27.—Former Lieutenant Maximilian of the Russian Guard has been cited to appear before the civil courts to answer for his participation in the duel last summer at Wittgenstein with Prince Alexander Sayn-Wittgenstein-Berleburg, which resulted fatally for the Prince. Ex-officers of the Russian army are not permitted to engage in duels.

TURKISH PRINCESS IS COMING TO VISIT THE UNITED STATES
Hairie Ben Ayad, the Daughter of a Former Ottoman Minister to France, Will Institute a Movement to Eradicate Polygamy in Her Native Land



PRINCESS HAIKIE BEN AYAD, WHO IS SOON TO VISIT AMERICA.
The United States is to receive a visit this winter from Princess Hairie Ben Ayad, who has created a stir in England by her crusade against social conditions in Turkey. The Princess, who is a daughter of a former Turkish Minister to France, hopes to eradicate polygamy in Turkey by organizing a movement against it from the outside. Her lectures in London have been crowded and she has become a fad with society there. She has a beautiful and refined face, unlike the usual heavy type of the east, and carries herself in a regal way. Her husband, who was sentenced to prison for espousing the cause of the deposed Sultan, Murad, but escaped, is with her in London. When out driving she wears a heavy veil over her face, according to Turkish custom.

Violent Death of Man at Corning Arouses Suspicion.

Will Hang From Same Gallows.
POPLAR BLUFF, Mo., Oct. 27.—Stephen Clark, white, and Zeb Crite, a negro, were sentenced to be hanged from the same gallows here on December 20. Clark stabbed Dr. Garrison of the Catholic University and Bishop Bradley of New Hampshire and about a thousand members of the Order of the Knights of Columbus attended a special vespers service at St. Patrick's Church in this city to-day. The Rev. Dr. D. J. Stafford preached the sermon, choosing for his text "Christian Manhood." Dr. Warren Courier was deacon and Rev. Dr. Burns of Holy Cross College sub-deacon. A choir of 100 voices took part in the service.

GALE WRECKS THEIR HOMES
Indians in Northern Villages Suffer From a Storm.

Skaguay Steamers Seek Shelter From Rougher of Seas.

CONFESES TO KILLING A BOY FOR HIS MONEY

MONTREAL, Oct. 27.—"I killed a boy last night," said Tobin Hanson, a Dane, twenty-five years of age, to the officer in charge as he entered the Central Police station to-day. He killed him for money and I only got fifty cents. That is not enough so I came to give myself up."

Ut Indians Return to Reservation.
DENVER, Oct. 27.—Governor Orman today received a telegram from Game Commissioner Harris, who has been at Meeker, Colo., for several days in consultation with Indian Agent Myton, saying that Agent Myton and 150 of the Ute Indians from his reservation in Utah had started for the reservation yesterday afternoon. Agent Myton decided to accompany them as far as the Utah line.
