RAILROAD MEN IN A BATTLE

Rival Forces in New Mexico Said to Have Shed Blood.

Four Men Reported Killed as a Result of the Conflict.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 6.—The relations between the Southern Pacific and the Santa Fe Railway are still strained and the bitter feeling between the forces of the contending companies is increasing.

A dispatch from Alamo Gordo, N. M., today, where the attorneys are arguing the motion to dismiss the injunction, states that the officials there were notified that a conflict between the rival forces of the workers at Deming, N. M., had taken place, resulting in the death of four men.

This report is not confirmed by railway men here, but it is stated that the Santa Fe forces overpowered four guards at Deming, seized a Southern Pacific switch engine and removed ninety cars of building material from the Southern Pacific yards to the Santa Fe.

The Southern Pacific had held up this material and the work of the Santa Fe forces was accordingly planned and successfully carried out, but if bloodshed resulted the officials here know nothing about it.
