OTTO HESSMAN ENDS HIS LIFE AFTER THRASHING

Tragic Ending of a Career Marked by Martial Unhappiness.

ALAMEDA, Nov. 24.—Driven to despair by marital misfortunes and brooding over a severe beating inflicted upon him by Arthur Stenbiht, whom he accused of alienating the affections of his wife, Otto Hessman committed suicide early this morning by taking a fatal dose of gas.
