Switchmen at Pittsburg Unable to Enlist Sympathy.

New Men Obtain Places Vacated by the Union Members.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 26.—Judging by apparent conditions, the switchmen's strike begun this morning has proved a failure.

The developments of the day, however, demonstrate that only a small number of the high valley, was seriously affected.

The other roads affected were the Baltimore and Ohio, twenty-five men out; the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, four men out; the Pennsylvania, six men out.

A meeting of the union was held this afternoon and the claim was made that the strike was a success as far as it had gone.

Should the condition in the Allegheny Valley, as it existed today, be continued longer than two days more, the mills and factories along the Allegheny River dependent on it for raw material will be compelled to close.
