

YOSEMITE CLUB GETS A PERMIT

Supervisors Hear Claims of Rival Fight Promoters.

Bar "Jim" Kennedy From Handling Future Fistic Encounters.

The resolution granting the Yosemite Club permission to hold a professional boxing exhibition in February was adopted by the Board of Supervisors yesterday.

Sir Thomas Fitzgerald of Australia, Who Was Knighted by the Late Queen Victoria, Talks of the Ravages of Disease in Ranks of the British Army in South African Camps

When the men stepped into the ring Herrera looked to be the heavier by at least ten pounds, owing to Hegarty's slight underpinning, but both men tipped the scales close to the 135-pound figure.

While the fight was looked upon as one of the world's greatest, the estimation of the sporting public, it is the idea of many that Hegarty's success tonight will be a great disappointment to him, as he came "touted" as a world-beater and was believed to be able to put Herrera away in any round.

A challenge from Rufe Turner of Stockton to fight the winner was read at the ringside. In the preliminary, between Tom Daly of Texas and George Parris of Los Angeles, Daly won in the second round on a foul.
