

POSSIBLE SEARCH FOR MURDERER August Hasch of Germantown Is Stabbed to Death.

Goes to Investigate Noise in His Barn and Later is Found Dying.

GERMANTOWN, Feb. 18.—August Hasch, a young man employed by Hochheimer & Co. of this place, was stabbed to death last night. Suspicion points to a vagrant named John Wallace as the murderer, and all day long parties have been searching the country in every direction in the hope of effecting his capture. Late to-night it was rumored here that Wallace had been captured by a blacksmith in Kirkwood and that Deputy Sheriff Z. T. Cowart was taking him to Willows. This report has not been verified.

G. A. Gutman and A. D. Piper, merchants, were going home last night, when they heard screams proceeding from a cross street. They went to investigate and found Hasch lying face downward and in the last throes of death. Help was summoned and he was conveyed to his home, where it was found that the left femoral artery had been severed, while two superficial cuts appeared on the neck and over the heart. Hasch died within a few minutes.

A careful search showed blood stains on the ground, extending from the point in the rear of Hasch's home to the place where the body was found, a distance of ninety yards. Hasch evidently had been stabbed at his home and had been brought to the barn.

Coroner Franey and District Attorney Long were summoned and an inquest was held immediately. The verdict of the jury was that Hasch had come to his death by a knife wound inflicted by a person unknown.

"Jack" Wallace has been in this section before and knew some of the workmen. He owed Hasch a small sum of money, and the two were seen together last evening. Just after supper Hasch heard a noise in his barn and went out to learn the cause. That was the last time he was seen until he was found lying on the street. As Wallace could not be found, the general belief was that he was the culprit, and parties went out all night and to-day in search of him.

RE. TSILKA ACCUSED OF COMPLICITY

Husband of Captive's Companion Is Under Arrest.

Fresh Sensation Follows the Release of Miss Stone by Brigands.

Couple Who Figure in the Daring Abduction of the American Missionary Educated in This Country.

PARIS, Feb. 18.—The Temps this evening publishes a dispatch from Constantinople which announces that Miss Ellen M. Stone has been released by the brigands who have held her captive since September 24 and has been handed over in good health to the dragoman of the American legation. The dispatch adds that the "Rev. Mr. Tsilka" has been arrested on the charge of complicity in the kidnaping of Miss Stone.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—Rev. Mr. Tsilka, who, according to the Constantinople correspondent of the Temps, in a dispatch announcing the release of Miss Stone, has been arrested on the charge of complicity in the kidnaping of the missionary, is the husband of Mme. Tsilka, Miss Stone's companion. It was announced recently that the Turkish authorities suspected the Rev. Mr. Tsilka of complicity in the abduction of Miss Stone.

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Mme. K. S. Tsilka, a Bulgarian woman, is the wife of Mr. Tsilka, a Macedonian teacher of Samakov. Mme. Tsilka was educated at Northfield Seminary in the Christian school of the daughter of Rev. W. W. Cox of Hoosick Falls, N. Y., who is now the wife of Dr. Bulkeley, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Mme. Tsilka at the time of receiving her American training and education was Miss Stephanoza, a Bulgarian, having been converted to the Christian faith by a medical missionary. Soon after the completion of her training the couple were married and went to Bulgaria, where they at once entered upon missionary work.

Miss Stone is one of the missionaries of the American board of foreign missions. She has been attached to the Salonica mission since 1878. She was born at Roxbury, Mass., and her home is in Chelsea, Mass., where her mother resides. Four of Miss Stone's brothers are in business in Boston.

RECOGNIZES THE OUTLAW AND TAKES HIM TO JAIL Former Ranger in Texas Captures a Man Notorious for Many Crimes.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 18.—After nine years of aimless wandering over Mexico, Arizona and New Mexico, Ramon Galindo, a notorious outlaw and fugitive murderer, returned to this city to-day and was arrested by ex-State Ranger Ed Bryant, who recognized him in spite of the lapse of time.

Ten years ago Galindo was the leader of the island outlaw band which operated in this county and committed innumerable crimes. Galindo, then, was in command of the West Texas detachment of State rangers, pursued the gang with a handful of men into Mexico, where he was ambushed and murdered. The incident created a great deal of excitement at the time and almost resulted in a border war for the Mexican authorities were accused of shielding the outlaw leader, and a large posse sent into Mexico to recover "ones" body must with resistance. The outlaw leader captured here to-day is almost sure to hang.

MINERS OBJECT TO JAPANESE DENVER, Feb. 18.—The white miners employed in the Maitland coal mines at Walsenburg struck to-day because the Japanese miners who were recently driven out of Chandler were taken to Walsenburg and put to work in the Maitland. The Japanese are working under guard.
