

SEYMOUR TAKES
EASTER BRAIN
Chief of Detectives Is
Probably Now in

The indications are that Chief of Detectives John Seymour is in Denver or thereabouts in search of Nora Fuller's murderer or investigating the clue to his identity or whereabouts. While Chief of Police Wittman retains an absolute silence on the whereabouts of Seymour, refusing to deny or affirm rumors as to his whereabouts, there are good reasons for the advanced belief that Seymour has gone to Denver.

When he left the city last Wednesday morning Seymour took the 7:30 boat across the bay and on arriving at the mole he was seen to take the Atlantic express. John A. Hammersmith, the prominent jeweler, and several others saw the Chief of Detectives boarding the train. He carried a small hand valise, which was only big enough to hold the few articles absolutely needed on a hurried trip.

It has been persistently argued by those interested in the solution of the mystery surrounding the young girl's death that the copy of the Denver Post, which was found in the room where the body was discovered, would prove an important clue if properly run down. It was a paper that arrived in this city three days after Nora Fuller disappeared. The copy of the paper was received by a local railroad man and subsequently turned over to a member of the United States Railway Employees, who was attending the convention of that body, which was in session at the time of Nora Fuller's disappearance. As there have been mysterious strange cases, similar to the Nora Fuller case, in Denver, it is more than likely that the police have received some clue which necessitated Seymour going to Denver or thereabouts.

SENATORS SETTLE FIGHT
FOR MELTER AND REFINER

Charles M. Gorham Wins and Frank A. Pedlar Is Promoted Assistant Coiner--Many
Aspire to Herold's Place on Harbor Board

TELEGRAMS from Washington received yesterday by Frank A. Leach, superintendent of the mint, announce that Senators Perkins and Bard have recommended the appointment of Charles M. Gorham melter and refiner to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Alex Martin. This recommendation settles a controversy. The compensation attached to the position is \$3000 per year. The appointment is really a promotion, as Gorham held the office of assistant melter at a salary of \$2500 per annum. He went into the mint many years ago, when Senator Sargent and Frank Page were in position to bestow Federal patronage in California. He is a brother of George C. Gorham, who figured conspicuously in the early political contests of this State, and who was defeated for Governor by H. H. Haight, and subsequently chosen secretary of the United States Senate.

Frank A. Pedlar, formerly postmaster at Woodland, brother of Dr. Pedlar, U. S. A., was an active aspirant for the office of melter and refiner. It was expected by many of his friends, among them several members of the executive branch of the Republican State Central Committee, that he would obtain the influence of Senator Perkins. When the news came from Washington that the Senators had settled the contest in Gorham's favor he was surprised, but the decision did not frustrate him. The message conveying the information of his promotion to the position of assistant melter to succeed Gorham.

The number of aspirants to succeed Rudolph Herold on the Board of State Harbor Commissioners is legion. Herold's term of four years will expire next Wednesday. Among the aspirants are Thomas Kirkpatrick, member of the executive branch of the Republican State Central Committee; Frank Marston, a prominent Native Son; State Senator Jack Tyrrell, and Sig Bettmann. As Herold is a Democrat, the error encounters strong pressure in favor of immediate selection of a Republican Commissioner. The hard work of listening to everything said for and against the applicants does not now wholly devolve upon Daniel Keavane. The new Adjutant General, George Stone, chairman of the Republican State Central Committee, is accessible to the expectant. During the strenuous time of the long Senatorial contest supporters of Burns were held together by promises of patronage on the water front. Many, if not nearly all of these promises, remain unredempted. The clamorous seekers for signs of redemption have been told time and again that the Governor and the "colonel" could do nothing as long as the Democrats had a voice in controlling appointments. When Colonel Kirkpatrick, manager of the Palace Hotel, was appointed to succeed Major Harney the army of the promised hoped that daylight would break, but the push was cast back into utter darkness by the unexpected news that Commissioners Kibura and Herold had nailed everything in sight for months ahead. The same old story will probably be told by the new Commissioner, whoever he is, in the selection of Herold's successor. Patronage expected is alluring to many political workers, but patronage distributed possesses a charm for only one of the many.

It is noted, moreover, that Democrats of the war horse kind are very close to the Gage administration. It is an open question whether the last Harbor Commissioner appointed by Gage is not more of a Democrat than a Republican. In Ludd's blue book he is rated as a Democrat. There is no doubt, however, about the political soundness of Thomas Kirkpatrick of the Republican State Central Committee. His fealty to the party is vouched for by Dan T. Cole, who is serving his country in the Mint. The opportunity is, therefore, presented to Gage of having on the board one Kirkpatrick of undoubted Republican proclivities.

The present members of the State Board of Equalization will ask for renomination. The petition will embrace Beamer and Toland, Democrats, as well as Brown and Brown, Republicans.
