The only protest of any moment was for the office of grand protector. There were four candidates, and on the first ballot there was no choice. Before the second ballot was taken the candidate who had received the lowest number of votes on the first ballot was dropped, and the second ballot was taken. The grand protector was elected by a vote of 12 to 10.

A resolution providing for the appointment of a State deputy who shall institute lodges and who shall be allowed reasonable traveling expenses when required to go outside of San Francisco was adopted.

A resolution to the effect that the Supreme Lodge be requested to assist the California jurisdiction by either a sum of money to be used for propagating purposes or the appointment of a State deputy supreme organizer at the expense of the supreme body was adopted.

A proposition to reduce the amount of the contingent fund usually allowed to the grand protector caused a great deal of discussion. It was finally decided that there should not be any change made. The proposal to pay members a pro-rata for securing new members was voted down.

Mrs. Emma Quizow was selected as the grand deputy who shall be allowed traveling expenses when going outside of San Francisco to build up existing lodges or establish new ones. The report of the committee on honored dead was adopted by a rising vote. Sacramento was selected as the next place of meeting for the Grand Lodge. T. H. Berkey on behalf of the Grand Lodge presented Grand Secretary Quisenberry with a handsome chain and emblematic charm as a mark of appreciation of his services. A. H. Anderson on behalf of the grand body presented the grand treasurer, A. Gompertz, with a fine ruby and gold shirt stud.

TWO PRINCIPALS GET RECIDIVOUS

The Board Fines Them and Dismisses Two Janitresses.

Blanchard Protests Against Roncovieri Sitting at His Trial.

The Board of Education met yesterday and voted to reprimand and fine Mrs. S. A. Miles, principal of the Sheridan School, and Mrs. A. E. Tiernan, principal of the Richmond School. The principals were charged with dereliction of duty in failing to report the defacing, cutting and mutilating of the walls and the writing of obscene inscriptions in the ante-rooms by pupils.

The board dismissed Mrs. Lane, janitress of the Sheridan School, and Miss Kate Callahan, janitress of the Richmond School, for negligence.

Mrs. Lizzie Andrews was appointed janitress of the Noe Valley School, vice Mrs. A. Craig, transferred to the Sheridan School, and Mrs. Foge was appointed janitress of the Richmond School.

Principal M. E. Blanchard, who was accused of unprofessional conduct, filed a formal protest against Director Roncovieri serving on the board during his trial, which has been set for next Monday. Blanchard says in his protest that Roncovieri is not qualified to try the case.

Blanchard's petition was denied by the board, and he proposes to sue out a writ of injunction in the Superior Court to restrain Roncovieri from sitting as one of the judges.

The board decided to set apart one-half of all teachers' salary forfeitures and fines to the credit of the public school teachers' annuity fund.

Leaves of absence were granted to Miss H. M. Murphy, Mrs. R. H. Hazelton, Miss M. S. Denis, Miss A. M. Martin and Miss F. A. Wickman.

No action was taken on Webster's motion to employ a competent searcher of records to investigate the title of the Lincoln School, proposed by other school property proposed to be transferred for library purposes. Webster explained that he was opposed to the purchase of school property, as he doubted the legality of such a proceeding.

Superintendent Webster filed his monthly report regarding the inspection of thirty schools by his deputies, and made the following recommendations: That an additional room be built on the premises of the Golden Gate Primary School for the accommodation of pupils.

That more attention be given to the seating of pupils with reference to the height of the room and the proper size and graduation of seats and desks. That when new seats and desks are purchased they be adjustable in height.

That in fire drills, except where the rear of yards open on the street pupils be required to assemble in the street and not in the yard.

That the Board of Education provide additional accommodations for the Laguna Honda School for the next school term.

That on the premises of the Whittier Primary School, the heating capacity of the basement cemented, the heating capacity of the furnace increased, the building painted, plastering repaired and rooms retiled.

That rules pertaining to classification should be amended and will so be recommended by this office near the end of the year.

First Steamer for Nome. The steamer Portland will be the first steamer to leave for Nome. She will leave on Saturday next, carrying the United States mail. The Portland has been thoroughly overhauled specially for the route and has been sheathed with iron-wood. She has the prospect of being the most comfortable steamer of the season.

Owing to special arrangements with the insurance companies it will not be necessary for the steamer to stop at Seattle. The master of the steamer Portland, is one of the most experienced pilots in northern waters. Her accommodations are filling up rapidly, and it is expected that she will go forward with a load of freight and passengers. On this initial trip the Portland will stop at Seattle, leaving the latter point on Saturday, April 23.

Handed Case Is Continued. The case of Fred Hansted, charged with an assault to do great bodily injury upon Thomas Garrett, was called in Judge Campbell's court yesterday. A certificate read from Dr. Rosenstern that Garrett would not be able to be in court for a week. Judge Campbell made an order continuing the case till to-morrow.

Charged With Beating His Mother. Lawrence Murphy was charged in Judge Fritze's court yesterday with battery upon his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy, who lives at 112 1/2 Mission street. As the evidence was conflicting, Murphy got the benefit of the doubt and the case was dismissed.
