## VINING RESIGNS OFFICE

### Manager Steps Out of the United Railroads.

He Will Be Temporarily Succeeded by M. D. Stein.

The expected happened yesterday when E. P. Vining, general manager of the United Railroads Company, tendered his resignation to President Holland. The same to take effect immediately. The expected also happened when President Holland signified his willingness to accept the resignation and said that he would inform the board of directors at his convenience of Vining's severance of connection with the corporation. Vining smiled cheerfully, bowed, and his connection with the great street railway corporation was permanently ended.

Some months ago when the project of the sale of the Market street railway system to the Baltimore syndicate was first published by the Call, the announcement was made that Vining's management of the affairs of the new company would be exceedingly brief. He was among the first slated to go, as his policy was distasteful to the directors, but it was decided to take no steps to hasten his removal until the new company assumed control of its property about May 1. The strike came, greatly to the surprise of the directors, who had been assured by Vining that there was absolutely no danger of such an event. His lack of foresight in this respect, coupled with the objectionable features of his policy, caused the directors to remove him with marked disfavour, and when he announced a few days ago that he was willing to step down, the directors greeted the news with no protesting voice raised.

**VINING DISAPPOINTED.**  
Vining was disappointed throughout the strike when the directors failed to consult him with reference to the affairs of the road, and his management practically ceased on the day the strike broke. His success completed his discomfiture and the result was his resignation some days earlier than was expected. Vining is one of the ablest railroad men in the country. His technical knowledge of the business is wonderful, but to use the expression of one of the directors of the company, "He does not know how to handle men. If he did, the strike would never have taken place."

**DIRECTORS ARE RELIEVED.**  
The directors of the company appear to be relieved now that Vining has resigned. During the strike several of them declared that they would not oppose him if taking this step and they intimated that he could resign to some extent. The question of his successor is now the all-absorbing topic in railway circles. Until a successor is appointed, the affairs of the system will be managed by senior Division Superintendent M. D. Stein, who is regarded as a very capable official. The appointment of a manager to succeed Vining rests with President Holland, but it is intimated that he will appoint only a man as is favourably considered by the owners. The man who is nearest to the throne at present is Slaughter Huff, one of the best all-around railroad men in the country. He is at present in Baltimore, but is expected to return home any day.

## ESCAPE PAYMENT OF FINES

### Late Strike Excuses Tardiness of All Teachers.

### Ocean Beach Requires Schoolhouse for Children.

The Board of Education met yesterday and adopted a resolution remitting the fines imposed on teachers for tardiness during the late street car strike.

—Miss Mary Denis, a teacher in the Spring Valley School, tendered her resignation, which was accepted. She will be married shortly.

Superintendent Webster was instructed to ask that different arrangements be made for the unloading of prisoners at the new police station on Fourth and Clara streets. Webster stated that under the plan now proposed an objectionable sight will be presented to the pupils of the Whittier School, which adjoins the station.

The residents of the Ocean Beach district filed a petition with the board asking for a twelve-class schoolhouse at the corner of Cliff House and Edna street, for the reason that the location is at the extreme end of the district and the majority of residents live at the other extremity. The association suggests that a six or eight class schoolhouse be built east of the power house, and another six class school somewhere in the neighborhood of the proposed site.

Dr. Robertson notified the board that James B. Sykes, a teacher in the department, had settled his bill which threatened to cause the latter some trouble for violating a rule.

Superintendent Webster protested against the board imposing a fine of \$5 upon one of his deputies, L. A. Jordan, for neglecting to file a monthly report submitted by Principal Bush of the Polytechnic School. On Webster's showing the board also decided to give the power to fine school deputies and Jordan's demand was ordered to be made out for the full amount.
