

AMBEREATED SHEEP

Oregon Settlers Destroy the Encroaching Flocks.

Four Hundred Carcasses Litter the Grant County Ranges.

News of Battle Between Their Owners and the Forces of the Cattlemen Is Expected.

PENDELTON, Or., June 20.—The carcasses of 400 slaughtered sheep lie on the ranges of northern Grant County as the result of two sheep-shooting affrays in the stock district to the south, news of which has just reached here.

In Bear Valley, a fertile spot taken up by small cattlemen, armed men on horses appeared before the flock of S. B. Barker of Condon, Or., just at dusk, and rained a merciless leaden fire upon the sheep until they lay bleeding on the ground.

At the head of Black Canyon, on Rock Creek, masked riders with Winchester held up William George, a herder for W. R. Mascall, burned the camp and robbed it and shot 150 ewes, whose lambs are dying as a result of the loss.

The stock situation in Central Eastern Oregon is very strained on account of the range overcropping, and shooting affrays take place every day or two, though on a smaller scale than those just reported.

FOUND UNCONSCIOUS NEAR HIS DEAD BOY

Mountain Teamster and Young Son Hurlled From Wagon on Steep Grade.

NEVADA, June 20.—Roy Gaffette, the eight-year-old son of John Gaffette, a mountain teamster, was killed on Saturday night on the road between North Bloomfield and Moores Flat, and John Gaffette suffered serious injury.

At 2 o'clock yesterday morning a party of men who had been to Bloomfield to attend a Masonic meeting were on their way home to Moores Flat when they discovered the horses in the brush, with the wrecked wagon still hitched to them.

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Wheeler Must Stand Trial.

REDDING, June 20.—George D. Wheeler, who killed his mining partner, G. F. Smith, at Bee Gum, will have to stand trial. A Deputy District Attorney has investigated the case and believes that Wheeler's jury was not justified in exonerating Wheeler.

Torenold was unable to speak. Nelson hitched his driving team and gave Mrs. Nelson the reins, while he held the bleeding boy in the back seat of the carriage.

CALIFORNIA TOWNS MARK PART OF DEMONSTRATIONS FOR THE FOURTH

Visalia Will Observe the Semi-Centennial Anniversary of Her Birth

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ALASKA'S ANCIENT VOLCANO NOW IN FULL ERUPTION.

Scientists Make Strange Discoveries on the Adjacent Peaks.

SEATTLE, June 20.—The Alaska Commercial Company's liner, the Captain Johnsen, reached port this morning from Valdes and westward points with thirty-six passengers and news from an uneventful trip and experienced pleasant weather, with the exception of a few days in Cook Inlet, where it was foggy and cloudy.
