8-FOOT LEDGE DOUBLE ROCK

Aged Prospector's Find on the American River.

Ten Pounds of Ore Yield Two Hundred Dollars in Treasure.

MARYSVILLE, Aug. 21.—John Beach, an old-time prospector who makes his headquarters at Auburn, has had years of treasure hunting with little or no reward. In the wild country on American River, above the North Fork bridge, he has struck a six-foot ledge that, according to some estimates, will assay \$5000 to the ton.

After going twelve miles for a rocker thirty-one and a half hours and cleaned up thirty-one and a half tons of gold. They staked three claims and then left for Kayak and Valdes to tell their friends. Believing they could not locate the gold for others without written permission, they were anxious to keep their discovery quiet until they could return and stake more ground.

The discoverer said that the gold came from large deposits of cement conglomerate, all the nodules being made of the creek. A glacier overruns the head of the creek and seems to be crushing out free gold, which is washed down stream in spring tides.

Correll, resigning; Lincoln County, vice Christian G. Hettman, resigning.

NORTHWESTERN FIREMEN PROCLAIM A GRIEVANCE. Object to the Promotion of an Employee of the Up-Coast Line.

SAN RAFAEL, Aug. 21.—Firemen on the California Northwestern Railroad claim to have a grievance and unless it is adjusted by September 1 they say they will leave their engines. The committee results from the promotion of a fireman to engineer, Carl Beggs, the fireman assert, was for a long time stoker on one of the locomotives, but about four months ago left the company's employ. From there he reinstated and given an engine. The firemen say they will prepare a petition and present it to the board of directors asking for Beggs' removal.

SKIPPED INSIDE ABOARD HIS BOAT. Captain Coogan a Prisoner on the John Riley.

SEATTLE, Aug. 21.—Captain Coogan, master of the little steamer John Riley, is reported insane and a prisoner on his own vessel on Koubek River, 200 miles to the interior from Kotzebue Sound. John Huff, a miner, carried the news to Nome.

STEPCHILDREN OPPOSE PAULINE LEVY'S PETITION. Claim Their Father's Widow Is Not Entitled to an Allowance From Estate.

Pauline Levy, widow of the late Henry Levy, and his ten children by a former wife appeared in Judge Troutt's court yesterday and waged bitter warfare over the \$40,000 estate left by the deceased. The children, some of whom are as old as their stepmother, are opposing her petition for a family allowance, claiming that she receives enough for her support from the income she receives from the flats on the corner of Franklin and Ellis streets, which were awarded to her as a homestead some time ago by Judge Troutt.

Boy Shoots Out of Revenge. James O'Donnell, a youth residing at 40 West Mission street, was shot by a boy with an air gun yesterday. The boys had been enemies for some time and it was said that O'Donnell's assailant took the method of evening up accounts. The bullet was embedded in O'Donnell's forehead. It was removed by Dr. Weyer at the Emergency Hospital, a warrant had been issued for the arrest of the boy who did the shooting.

NOOSE AND LIMB AWAIT CULPRIT. Mountaineers Seek the Johnson Sides and His Tribe Come From Nevada.

TUOLUMNE, Aug. 21.—Lynching awaits a man for whom armed miners of this vicinity are searching, but who appears to have eluded his would-be captors. Two daughters of Samuel Galvin, aged 5 and 7 years, while going to meet their father last evening on his return from looking forward to a profitable harvest. The Providence mine, were enticed away by a stranger, who promised them some candy. After they had gone with the man a short distance they became frightened and wanted to return home. The brutal stranger prevented this by force, until finally their screams frightened him away. Before going he told them to be at the same place to-night. When the screams of the children had brought assistance the eldest was attacked by a lot of hysterics and she is still very ill. Throughout the night armed miners searched for the brute, but without avail. The only description that the children could give was that he was a middle-aged man with a black beard. The father of the little girls lay in wait to-night with a shotgun at the spot where the screams of the children had been heard. The search has not yet been abandoned, and should the culprit be caught his fate will not long remain in doubt.
