LATE MRS. CHARLES FAIR'S BROTHER ARRIVES IN ADVANCE OF RELATIVES

C. J. Smith, Accompanied by His Wife and Child, Comes From Colorado to Guard His Interest in the Estate of the Wealthy Decedent—Mrs. Nelson, Aged Mother of Dead Woman, Will Reach City This Morning

AMONG the arrivals at the Occidental last evening were Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Smith and child from Boulder Creek, Colo. Smith is a brother of the late Mrs. Charles Fair and comes here to guard his interests in his sister's estate.

Smith is a mining man and has not seen his sister for many years. He says there are eight relatives who will divide Mrs. Fair's estate. They are Mrs. Hannah E. Nelson, mother of Mrs. Fair; Abe Nelson, a half-brother; W. B. Smith, Frank Smith, C. J. Smith, all brothers of the deceased; and Laura Leonard and Lily Bunell, her sisters, and the children of the late Sadie Leffer, who was also a sister of Mrs. Fair.

C. J. Smith, who is the first of the relatives of the late Mrs. Fair to arrive in the city, is very cautious in his statements. In answer to the question of his object in visiting the city, he replied that he was here for the purpose of seeing that his sister was buried with respect. He says that he does not think that there will be any litigation with the Fairs over the estate.

Mrs. R. Gilman Brown Wins the Women's Championship in a Walk.
