JUDGE EXPLAINS A TRUST CASE

Opinion Filed in Recent Miriam Berger Litigation.
TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 11.—Justice Van Sickle, this afternoon, filed in the Court of Errors his written opinion in the case of Miriam Berger against the United States Steel Corporation, that was decided a short time ago in favor of the corporation. The opinion is an elaborate one. In the opinion Justice Van Sickle says the general act concerning corporations authorizes corporations to retire shares of preferred stock purchased with bonds or the proceeds of bonds; that the directors may declare how many shares are to be retired, and that the failure to retire the number will not defeat that plan. The act of 1902, which was passed especially for the benefit of the United States Steel Corporation, Justice Van Sickle says, does not enlarge the company's powers as they were under the general corporation act, but rather restricts them. The company has power to sell bonds on the market or to sell them to stockholders at the same value. Taking up the point raised by Mrs. Berger that J. P. Morgan & Co., who received \$16,000,000, was being overpaid, the petition says:

RIVER TO BEAR WHOLE VILLAGE

Benton, Nebraska, Will Float Down Stream a Few Miles.

LEXINGTON, Neb., Oct. 11.—The village of Benton, Neb., located a few miles from here, has decided to move. This does not mean the people alone, but the buildings, houses and stores, besides all the personal effects, will float down the Platte River for three miles to a location which the villagers prefer to its present one. Nothing will be left behind but the natural scenery which was there when the village was built. "If the railroad will not come to me then I will go to the railroad." Such is the paraphrase of the story of Mohammed and the mountain as given by the village of Benton. The decision to move came with the announcement of the Union Pacific Railroad that a new town named Darr would be established at the point where the line crossed the Platte River. This is three miles down stream from the present group of houses called Benton. The railroad added to its announcement that the construction of a large elevator and mill would be immediately started at Darr. "ELIJAH" DOWIE ASKS FOR COIN

Disciples of the Prophet Are Commanded to Contribute.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Acknowledging his inability to pay his bills, John Alexander Dowie, the "reincarnation of Elijah, the prophet," has issued a letter to his disciples pleading for money "in sums of \$5 and upward." In the same letter he asserts his assets are \$23,736,152, yet to-day when W. M. Hoyt & Co. made a demand upon Dowie's agent for \$31, a bill long overdue, the agent protested he did not have the money, but would try and get it together by to-morrow. In his begging letter Dowie begins by telling about Zion's flourishing condition. Then he declares that people who are trying to collect bills from him at this time are "the enemies of God." Extracts from the letter follow: "Unexpected difficulties have made it impossible to get together sufficient sums to meet the current obligations of Zion. Therefore I send forth this appeal asking every member to immediately take action upon it, so that I may be able to discharge immediately all open accounts without further delay and so maintain the

good name which Zion has borne for its prompt settlements. "We shall receive sums of \$5 and upward for periods of three, six and nine months, as may be most convenient. It is adverse to the defendants, and if sustained in the final hearing it will mean that the bucket shops of the State have to quit business.
