

# REPUBLICANS FIGURE ON MAJORITY OF PARDEE

## SCENES AT REPUBLICAN STATE HEADQUARTERS IN PALACE HOTEL

### Deluge of Dispatches from Interior Counties.

### Four Thousand Majority Is Figured for Pardee.

TELEGRAMS of congratulation, telegrams of inquiry and dispatches containing figures followed thick and fast at headquarters of the Republican State Central Committee yesterday. W. M. Cutter, Charles H. Spear, Jacob Steppacher and their assistants were kept busy from morning until night. Early in the day a message was sent to each county committee chairman and two other prominent Republicans in every county of the State requesting that official figures on Governor should be wired without delay to headquarters. In response to this request messages came from every county but Mariposa. Spear estimated Mariposa at 300 for Lane. The county went Democratic two years ago by a majority of 20.

**4000 FOR PARDEE.**

After all the returns had been tabulated and careful additions made by the chairman of the State committee and the chairman of the campaign committee the information was given out that Pardee was elected by 4000 majority. It transpired as the returns were received that the inside estimates prepared a day or two before the election were not far out of the way. The result in Santa Clara County was a disappointment to the campaign managers and was at variance with the forecast. The result in San Joaquin was unexpected. When the committee ascertained that Pardee had only received the trivial majority of 50 in Solano County, where Alden Anderson, nominee for Lieutenant Governor, got 990 majority, great surprise was expressed. The way Dr. Pardee was hammered in Kern County also surprised the experts. As forecasted by The Call, Pardee came over the Tehachapi range with a plurality

of 10,000. The Republican pluralities in Humboldt, Marin, Napa, Alameda and other counties gave the nominee for Governor sufficient strength to render his election sure. The total vote in San Francisco was accurately foreshadowed by The Call, but the Republican vote in the

**BANNER COUNTY OF THE STATE.**

Yesterday Los Angeles Republicans gave notice to the State Committee that they wanted the banner. Steps will be immediately taken to transfer the silken trophy from San Francisco to the chief city of the orange groves. The Call, early in the campaign, announced that the banner would be won by Los Angeles. The Union League Club is the custodian of the trophy and will doubtless make fitting arrangements for the surrender of the standard to the Republican County Committee of Los Angeles. In 1900, when San Francisco gave McKinley a majority approximating 10,000, the banner was taken from Alameda, which county had previously captured it from Los Angeles.

The Republicans keenly feel the loss of three Congressmen in California but there is considerable elation over the result in the Legislature, which renders the election of a Republican United States Senator sure. The Republicans will control both branches of the Legislature. The contest for the Speakership will soon begin.

**AMENDMENT NO. 28.**

There is not the slightest doubt that Assembly constitutional amendment No. 28—No. 8 on the ballot—has been rejected by an overwhelming vote, but vigilance may be necessary in order that the result may be properly certified to the Secretary of State. It is suggested that every County Clerk, whose duty it is to render a certificate, should personally inspect the document certifying the vote, so that no error may creep in. The schemers who planned and executed the midnight maneuver to rush the amendment through both houses of the Legislature may be ready for another deal.

## LANE DOES NOT YIELD ANY POINTS

### Refuses to Concede Pardee's Election Till Ballots Are Counted.

THE election of Pardee, which the local Democracy was slow to acknowledge, notwithstanding the returns which were booming along from the south and north, and which showed steady gains for the Republican candidate for Governor, proved to be a bitter pill for the friends of Lane to swallow. Owing to the fact that Lane refused to concede Pardee's election until the final returns placed that contention beyond dispute, there was talk last night that a contest was inevitable.

The comparatively small plurality of Lane in San Francisco was a sincere disappointment to his friends. It was believed he would carry the city by not less than 12,000, and many enthusiasts placed the figures at 15,000. But unfortunately for Lane, he failed to capture the heavy vote which was expected in the Republican precincts. His plurality of 553, while a fine testimonial of the regard in which he is held by his party and the voters generally, was insufficient to overcome the majority of Pardee rolled up by the interior counties and which doomed Lane to defeat.

Charles F. Curry's tremendous plurality of 400 was the result of painstaking work of the friends of the Secretary of State. This was more than duplicated by the magnificent run made by W. W. Shannon, who next to Lane polled the highest vote in the State, although a Republican, had many friends among Democrats, as his vote of 32,447 showed. Chief Justice Beatty polled the third highest vote, he having 31,976 to his credit. The re-election of Justice Beatty is gratifying to the members of the San Francisco bar as well as to the attorneys-in-all parts of the State.

**ATTORNEYS ARE SATISFIED.**

The election of Judges Angellotti and Shaw as Associate Justices met with the approval of all attorneys who have business with the Supreme Court. The wonderful fight made by Frank C. Jordan for Clerk of the Supreme Court was rewarded in this city with a plurality of over 900, and the indications are that Jordan ran equally strong in other parts of the State. The fact that Alden Anderson, Republican, Lieutenant Governor-elect, ran ahead of his ticket in San Francisco, he having polled 24,903 votes to Pardee's 24,129, is a source of gratification to his friends in this city.

## CHAIRMAN CAMINETTI DECLARES PARDEE VOTES WERE THROWN AWAY

### Believes That Pardee Has Not Yet Been Elected.

### Bases His Statement Upon Telegrams Received.

A. CAMINETTI, chairman of the Democratic campaign committee, was kept busy at the rooms of the Democratic State Central Committee last night. He was engaged in the pleasant occupation of receiving majorities and by midnight was ready to declare that Lane would have been elected if votes for him had not been thrown out.

The headquarters were almost deserted. The defeat of the entire State ticket was disheartening to the members of the committee. No one was around to help Caminetti, who is a Republican, to explain the Democratic candidate for Governor was at home and not one of his energetic workers was on hand to help Caminetti in his task. A few clerks strolled in and out in a heedless sort of way, their occupation gone.

Mr. Caminetti gave out the following statement to the press:

From reports received from the chairman of county committees in about three-fourths of the counties, and taking into consideration the balance and also basing my opinion on the last conversation I had on the telephone with Mr. Gaffey of Los Angeles, who says that Los Angeles has gone for Pardee by about 4500, cutting down the Republican estimate of 1120. I do not feel warranted in giving up the claim of Lane's election.

I feel justified in saying that Mr. Lane received a majority of the votes deposited in the ballot boxes yesterday and that from my telegraphic communications with chairmen of counties, San Bernardino and Napa and other counties, over 3000 ballots were excluded by Republican boards of election on account of a cross being placed upon the wrong nomination. I am satisfied that the same thing occurred in other counties, to what extent I am unable to state. The matter will be submitted to our law committee tomorrow morning. The committee is composed of W. H. Beatty, William H. Alford, Frank H. Gould, W. J. Magee and William H. Alford.

**THROWING OUT OF BALLOTS.**

### Democratic Candidate Has Not Given Up All Hope.

### Expresses Intention of Contesting the Election.

Franklin K. Lane, erstwhile Democratic candidate for Governor, remained at home all day receiving the condolences of his friends upon his defeat. In every instance Mr. Lane declined to accept the messages of sympathy as he was still undecided whether Dr. Pardee was victorious. He was asked whether he had sent a congratulatory telegram to his opponent, and he replied that he had not done so nor would he do so until he was certain that the Republican candidate was elected. He said:

In view of the returns that I have received from private sources and from the Associated Press, I am not willing at this time to concede the election of Dr. Pardee. On the contrary, I believe I have been elected.

I understand that 1200 votes that were cast for me in Alameda County were thrown out on the technicality that the ballots were not properly marked; that 30 per cent of the Democratic vote in San Bernardino was likewise treated, and that the totals in Humboldt and Los Angeles counties were withheld in order to ascertain what number of ballots in the county would be necessary to overcome the majority that San Francisco gave the head of the Democratic ticket.

**LANE WILL CONTEST.**

About 1:30 o'clock this morning I heard from Alameda that the officials were withholding all returns until this city's vote was given out. I chartered a taxicab and dispatched many union men, headed by a representative of the Typographical Union, to investigate the situation. They visited many of the polling places and found discrepancies between the returns and the actual vote. In numerous booths they were refused access to the returns, one set of officials going so far as to remove the ballots into another room, where they were counted.

"Then it will be inferred, Mr. Lane, that there will be a contest after the returns show the election of Dr. Pardee?"

"Most assuredly there will be a contest," said Mr. Lane. "The law committee of the State Central Committee will look into this matter to-morrow. I am a good loser, but I am unwilling to concede my defeat until I am sure."

## LEGISLATURE WILL BE OVERWHELMINGLY REPUBLICAN IN BOTH OF ITS BRANCHES

## SOLDIERS' WIDOWS MUST RETURN GOVERNMENT LAND

### Interior Department Acts Upon the Charges of Fraud Made Against Some Women in Nebraska.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The Interior Department has suspended with a view of cancellation, a large number of alleged "fraudulent land entries in Nebraska made by soldiers' widows, who, it is charged, have entered into an agreement for the transfer of the lands to cattlemen.

W. N. Lesser of Iowa, a special agent, whose headquarters have been for several years at North Platte, Nebr., has been suspended in connection with these proceedings. The suspension follows an investigation quietly conducted in Nebraska by Colonel John S. Mosby, the former guerrilla leader, who is now a special agent of the General Land Office.
