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BOARD ELECTS FIVE NEW TEACHERS

Places Five Additional Names on Substitute List.

Makes Several Assignments and Then Accepts One Resignation.

The Board of Education yesterday elected five new teachers in the School Department.

The following named were placed on the substitute list, to report for duty immediately, they being the next in order in the recent competitive examination.

Miss Anita A. Judson, Miss Martha Loewi, Miss Rose Prince, Miss Rachael Kurlandzik and Miss Theresa Sullivan.

Miss M. E. Hurley was transferred from the Lincoln School to the Adams School, and Miss Pearl Hobart from the Lincoln to the Garfield School.

The following assignments were made, to take effect January 15, 1903: Miss Edna Parsons, Garfield School; Miss Edna Wilson, Edison School; Miss Edith Cullin, Lincoln School; Miss Mattie Read, Irving Scott School; and Miss Mary C. O'Connell, Fremont School.

The resignation of L. T. Merwin as a teacher in the Polytechnic School was accepted.

The board granted leave to Mrs. J. B. Holden to accompany the Parents' Association to Sacramento should it be necessary to take the deaf and dumb children before the educational committee of the Legislature for the purpose of urging an appropriation for the teaching of deaf and dumb pupils.

The petition of Rebecca Greenan that she be reinstated in her position as principal of the John W. Taylor School and that she be paid back salary to the amount of \$300 was denied.

John W. Wilkinson, having failed to properly qualify, was dropped from the eligible list.

Leaves of absence were granted Miss May Casey and Mrs. C. Isaacs.

Miss Augusta Ruth Bresler was appointed special teacher of German and assigned to the Cooper and Hancock schools, to date from January 12, 1903, at a monthly salary of \$75.

INSPECTOR COMPLAINS TO PUBLIC WORKS BOARD

Thomas Regan Says He Is Discriminated Against in the Matter of Employment.

The Board of Public Works yesterday listened to the complaint of Thomas Regan, a street inspector, who charged that although he stood No. 4 on the civil service eligible list, he was given less work than D. J. O'Brien, who stands No. 8 on the list.

Regan objected to being discriminated against, stating that last month he made but \$2, while O'Brien had drawn \$100.

Regan claimed that it was not fair to give inspectors who stand lowest on the list more advantageous work than those who are higher up.

He also called attention to the fact that although he was No. 1 on the list for superintendent of paving the board had given the place to Charles Gallagher, who was second, at a salary of \$150 per month.

Manson explained that the reason why those lower on the list made more money was because the work on which they were engaged lasted longer.

Obinhus expressed the opinion that preference should be given the men highest on the list, and the matter was taken under advisement.

CLAIMS FRAUD WAS PRACTICED

Miss Edna Ellert Renews Battle for Share of Estate.

Makes Several Startling Allegations Against Her Mother.

The claim of Miss Edna Belleite Ellert, daughter of the late ex-Mayor L. R. Ellert, to a portion of her father's estate is again to be tried in the courts and the allegations contained in the complaint filed yesterday give promise of furnishing much sensational testimony.

Miss Ellert brings suit against Mrs. Sara E. Ellert to set aside an assignment made by the plaintiff to all claim to her share in her father's estate on the ground that she was induced to make the assignment by Mrs. Ellert, who took advantage of her incapacity and lack of knowledge of the laws of this country.

The complaint sets forth that Mrs. Ellert was appointed administratrix of the estate on September 3, 1901, and that the wife, daughter and a son, Arthur L. Ellert, were the sole heirs.

The plaintiff states that she is entitled to an undivided one-sixth of an estate that she believes to be worth \$30,000.

She states that she resided in Switzerland for eight years, and on October 2, while in Switzerland attending school, her mother took advantage of her incapacity and lack of knowledge of the United States law and induced her to make an assignment for \$800 of all interest in the estate; that her mother represented to her daughter that the latter's share in the estate was not valued at more than \$800.

The plaintiff further alleges that there was an intent to defraud, and asks that the assignment be annulled.

Charge Against Kane Dismissed. The case of Frank J. Kane, secretary of the Pacific Humane Society, charged with impersonating an officer, was called in Police Judge Mogan's court yesterday.

The records showed that Kane's commission as a special officer had not been renewed since July 1, 1896. Kane testified that he believed he was still a special officer, as he had never been notified that his commission was annulled.

The judge asked Kane if he would accept notice that he was no longer a special, and he replied in the affirmative. The judge thereupon dismissed the case.
