James Maxwell Wilson, University Building Suffers From the Wind.

Becomes Prominent Through Work Carried on for the Government.

BERKELEY, Jan. 27.—James Maxwell Wilson, assistant professor of irrigation of the University of California, died last night at his residence at 1337 Dwight street after a long illness brought on by apoplexy.

At the beginning of his illness he was working on an important series of experiments near Fresno, relative to the prevention of the rise of alkali in the surface of the soil.

Professor Wilson has not been in good health since the summer of 1901 and three months ago he had a severe attack of apoplexy while in the Berkeley Bank of Savings.
