CARMEN WILL DECIDE TO-DAY

Their Action on Short List Is Awaited Anxiously. If Both Sides Stand Firm Strike Will Be Called On To-Night.

Unless the members of the Streetcar Union and the officials of the United Railroads come to a mutual agreement to-day in reference to the newly adopted check system a strike will probably be declared on at midnight to-night.

Director Joseph S. Tobin made the following statement in regard to the controversy: "I think that the board of directors of the United Railroads are the fairest-minded body of men you could find in this city."

President Cornelius was told of Director Tobin's statement and said in reply: "We don't want to do our fighting through the papers. When the time comes we will take whatever steps are necessary."

Manager Chapman was seen last evening. He was very reticent, however, and refused to discuss the controversy. Director Holbrook was also seen.

It took Judge Dunne only a few minutes yesterday morning to deny the application for a writ of habeas corpus for the release of Mamie Lin, alias Lulu Wilson.

The woman refused to answer the question, "Do you know the defendant, Ernest Alexander?" and Attorney Mack, who appeared for her in the unavoidable absence through sickness of Attorney Archie Campbell, based his argument for the application on the meaning of the word "know."

As I understand it, the petitioner here was adjudged guilty of contempt of court in one of the departments of this court and punished therefor, and it is claimed that the proceedings therein were irregular, and that there is error in the order.

It is true that from time to time attorneys have from what must appear a misunderstanding of the law and perhaps Robert Ferguson, in other motives, sued out writs of habeas corpus in other departments of the court, and unfortunately in some instances have been successful.

After Judge Dunne had dismissed the writ of habeas corpus and remanded Lulu Wilson into the custody of the Sheriff, she was taken into Judge Lawlor's court, where the trial of ex-Police Officer Alexander was scheduled to be continued.

Lulu Wilson's attorney appealed to the Supreme Court in the afternoon for decision as to whether the question, "Do you know Alexander?" was material. The court took no action in the matter.
