

SPORTS OF THE TRACK, THE POLO FIELD AND OF THE LEASH

KRISHNA STARTS IN A MILE RACE

Meets Kenilworth and Others at Ingleside This Afternoon.

High-Class Field Expected for the California Derby.

The week's sport at Ingleside race course opens to-day with a good card, the feature of which is the closing number at a mile, in which such well-known performers as Kenilworth, Krishna, Peter J. Durazo and Felix Bard are entered to meet.

A number of handicaps, in which many of the best horses here will likely start, are on the programme for the week. There is much interest in the California Derby, which will be decided next Monday, when Washington's Birthday will be celebrated. This race, which will have a value of about \$400, is at a mile and a quarter and will bring together the leading three-year-olds in training. A field of twelve may go to the post.

Walter Jennings is represented by six eligibles, the principal ones being Krishna and Elliott. The impressive showing of Krishna when he took the California Jockey Club Futurity stakes makes him a most important factor. Mr. Jennings also has Proper, Arabo, Arcade and Silbo entered.

Green Morris will probably start two. He has Gold Van, Durazo, Artiva and Grayina from which to select representatives.

Other eligibles are Claude, Fossil, Eberlin, Gold Bell, Honiton, Organdie, American, Epicure and Dupont.

First and second money in the Palace Hotel handicaps added materially to the amount credited to Green Morris and he is a good second on the list of winning owners, with \$16,350. W. B. Jennings & Co. are still well in front, with \$23,740. A large number of owners have shared in the \$28,129 distributed since the season opened more than sixty having won sums exceeding \$1000. 
In the morning on the same ground a team of Vampires played a practice match against the second eleven of the American-British Rifles, beating them eight goals to nothing.

Peterson's Greyhound Defeats America Pointless.

In the next round Game Boy was withdrawn, giving Haphazard a bye. He then defeated Bonnie Pasha by the close score of fourteen to twelve, which placed him in the deciding course with America. He



led the representative of the Geary kennels four lengths and shut him out pointlessly, for the first prize, the score being six to nothing.

The open stake was won by the greatly improved Sempronius. The Chirini crack beat Roman Athlete and won all his trials cleverly. In the deciding course he met Pasha Pleasant. Sempronius showed five lengths of speed and won by a score of six to nothing.

In the sapling stake, for greyhounds whelped last year, Mad Mab proved the best. In the deciding course Lena led her three lengths. Mad Mab showed great gameness and cleverness, winning finally by a score of twelve to eight.

The hares were unusually strong several greyhounds having to be withdrawn because of hard running. There were a number of upsets, nineteen long shots winning out of the forty-eight trials run.
