

# GRAND ARMY COMMANDER ARRIVES WITH HIS PARTY

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GENERAL THOMAS J. STEWART, COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, ARRIVED IN THIS CITY EARLY THIS MORNING AND HEAD OF THE ORGANIZATION IN THE STATE.

GENERAL THOMAS J. STEWART, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, arrived in this city at an early hour this morning accompanied by his party, which includes members of his staff. General Stewart was to have arrived yesterday afternoon and a committee of California Grand Army men had prepared to meet him at the Sixteenth-street depot in Oakland. The train on which the party came was several hours late, however.

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# SHARON WANTS STEWART'S TOGA

## Comstock Manager Desires Senatorship of Nevada.

### Strong Influences Are Behind Him in His Lofty Ambition.

When Nevada comes the story that a formidable rival to John Sparks of Reno, Judge A. F. Fitzgerald of the Supreme Court of that State in their aspirations to succeed Senator William Stewart, 60 years hence, has been discovered in the person of William E. Sharon, the well-known Comstock operator, who is expected soon to make known his candidacy for the nomination.

The same story is going the rounds of the Palace, where, up to last evening, a Nevadaian identified with politics of the Sagebrush State has been appearing for several days. Mr. Sharon has been in the city for about a week, which he was seen frequently in conference with these men, a fact that added strength to the story that is being laid by his political wires for the next campaign.

When asked last night at the Palace Hotel if he had heard of Sharon's candidacy, Congressman-elect Van Duzer of Nevada, who trains with the Nevadaian, said that he had heard of it, but that he believed Sharon was the logical candidate and would have no difficulty in securing the nomination, "and," he added, "if he is nominated, he will probably get the best kind of a vote in the Legislature."

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# JEALOUSY LEADS INTO A STABBING AFFRAY

## Distraction of One Man With the Other's Wife Causes of the Fight.

SAN JOSE, Feb. 22.—A woman's smiles and the jealousy of a husband resulted in a stabbing affray at New Almaden last evening and the arrest of Joaquin Sanchez on a charge of assault to murder. A more serious charge may yet be placed against Sanchez for attacking the wife of another man, who may die.

Sanchez is a miner about 25 years old. Carrasco is a laborer at the mining town and has a rather good-looking wife. Sanchez cast side glances at Mrs. Carrasco as he passed her house going to his daily work and the woman returned these with smiles.

This distraction aroused the jealousy of Carrasco and last night he followed Sanchez as he went on his way to work. He accused him of being attentive to his wife and threatened revenge. A row followed in which Carrasco knocked Sanchez down and proceeded to pummel him.

Sanchez made an attempt to get away, but could not. He had a miner's candlestick with him and this he used. The candlestick has a long, stiletto-like edge and he stuck it into the walls of the shaft. With this he stabbed Carrasco five times. The wounds are in the neck, chest and back, and the candlestick was driven into the man's body to a depth of four or five inches.

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# MASCAGNI WINS NEW HONORS AT TWO CONCERTS

Rossini, Mascagni, the "Stabat Mater" and a house two thousand strong is the brief tale of yesterday's festival at the Alhambra. Three o'clock was set for the opening of the concert, but with 3 o'clock the crowds were still straining in and the ticketless tearfully imploring the privilege of standing room. Half after the hour found the crowds still surging in, every inch that would prop a sole occupied and a procession of disappointed folks filling down Eddy street, adding dolingness to the appropriate drizzle. What will finally happen if Mascagni's popularity still goes crescendo it is difficult to prophesy, for it is at forte, fortissimo, now. Given a hall twice as large as the Alhambra, and it could have been crowded yesterday, and the old house was like to crack its walls with the enthusiasm that beat upon them. Yes, though "was Sunday" and the "Stabat Mater" and half the audience devoted.

It was a largely different audience from the first two. The men were out to help in the palm thunder, for they were there yesterday to see if madame's fervors were justified. And again the musicians came, for they will now miss no note of the maestro's.
