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SPECIAL THANKSGIVING SERVICES END GOLDEN JUBILEE CELEBRATION

Six Hundred Sunday-School Children and Thirteen Hundred Members Participate in Closing Features of First Presbyterian Church Observance of Its Fiftieth Year of Existence, Song Recital Filling Evening

Special Policeman John Morrison Is Badly Beaten.


