VICTIMIZED RACING MEN. Vice worked his frauds by going over to the racetrack, where he is well known and soliciting racehorse men to purchase their tickets from him.

"Ben" Kretzlson, a well-known race track man, was not so fortunate. Last Monday he called at the office of the National Pacific, and seeing Vice back of the counter asked him to give him a ticket to Chicago and return.

Another victim of Vice is the wife of a well-known race horse man. On Thursday morning, she says, she called at the office of the railroad company to purchase a ticket to Buffalo.

FACTS GIVEN OUT. One after another the men who had paid Vice money called into the office yesterday and hour by hour Vice's case grew more serious.

"It was not until this morning that I knew that Vice was short in his accounts. An order for a ticket was presented signed by Vice. I told Vice to ask about the matter. He left the office saying that he would go out at once to get the money to make the ticket good.

DAUGHTER IN IGNORANCE. A distressing incident of the affair is that Vice's only daughter, who is well known in the city, is ignorant of the fact that her father is a fugitive.

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
