

SHIP PARAMITA ENTERS THE BAY Stopped in Mid-Ocean for Twenty-Nine Hours.

Cruiser Boston and the Gunboat Bennington to Leave Port.

The ship Paramita, from Newcastle, with Captain Baeckus in charge, arrived in this port yesterday. The Paramita had a slow voyage, owing to rough weather. During the trip she was obliged to lie to in mid-ocean for twenty-nine hours, until a connecting rod which had broken could be repaired.

Captain Wallace Returning. Captain George Wallace, who piloted the Sonoma from this port a week ago last Friday, when she left on her regular trip for Honolulu and the Antipodes, and who was unable to leave the boat owing to the rough weather, was compelled to make the short trip to Honolulu on the Sonoma, which arrived here last Friday. Captain Wallace is now on his way to this port, having left Honolulu last Friday night on the steamship Nebraska.

British Steamship Arrives. The large British freight steamer Royalist Captain Bland arrived in this port yesterday from Antwerp with a cargo of 4000 tons of rails consigned to the Southern Pacific Company.

Pasadena Brings Sheep. The steamship Pasadena arrived in this port yesterday from the Santa Cruz Islands, bringing as a cargo 1000 head of sheep.

Warships to Leave. The usual Sunday crowds visited the warships now lying in the bay. The cruiser Boston and the gunboat Bennington will leave early this week for Bremerton.



ARCHITECTS, CONTRACTORS AND CITY OFFICIALS PAY VISIT OF INSPECTION TO CEMENT WORKS



A PARTY of more than 100 representative citizens went on an excursion on Saturday last to Cement Works in Solano County. The party included members of the Technical Society of the Pacific Coast, well-known architects, city officials and builders and contractors. They took the trip for the purpose of inspecting the great cement manufacturing plant and lands of the Pacific Portland Cement Company.

The plant was established last August and its product has proved so entirely satisfactory and the demand for it has been so far beyond the most sanguine expectation that men connected with the building trades and those holding official positions in the city in connection with public buildings and construction have watched the progress with much interest, and especially since the industry is of great moment to the State of California.

The tests of the material, say the officials, both as regards clay and limestone, fully warranted the confidence that has been placed in the undertaking. The visitors were received at the works by Colonel George Stone, president of the company; Nathan Bell, the secretary, and Morris Kind, C. E., superintendent and constructor of the plant, and were conducted first to the quarry. The deposit of limestone covers half a mile square, with a depth of 100 feet. The quarry face, opened up to now, measures 400 feet and is 35 feet high. The material runs exceptionally uniform, and according to the tests made by various experts is of a very high quality.

SEE CEMENT MANUFACTURED.

After inspecting the quarry the party visited the clay deposits. The journey was then resumed to the mill, where the experts followed the material through its various stages. They witnessed first the mixing of the limestone and clay at the "brick house," then descended to the "drier house," where the mixed material went through the drying process. Descending farther, the party witnessed the process at the "first grinding house," where the material was crushed into particles. The process which followed was extremely interesting, the material from the "first grinding house" finding its way into the great rotary kilns with a rattle and din much resembling the discharge of musketry.

COMPANY IS FORTUNATE.

Colonel Heap said the company was fortunate in the natural location of their works, having the limestone and clay close together and both easily accessible. As the clay and limestone were both situated above the mills, said the colonel, gravity assisted in their transportation. The mills he said were arranged so that the raw material was delivered to the upper end and the finished product was deposited at the lower end, right at the railroad track, for transportation. The industry, said Colonel Heap, must be valuable to the State and to the whole of the Pacific Coast.

ers, whose sole duty it is to turn the cement into the sacks, a method of packing in accord with the practice in the East, where the consumer it is said, finds the use of sacks for shipment better than barrels.

The whole process was achieved with remarkable precision and much to the satisfaction of the visitors. There are more than 100 men employed on the grounds of the Pacific Portland Cement Company, and since the inauguration of the plant in August last there have been erected many new dwellings for extra hands, more store houses and offices. Owing to the demand for the domestic article, which is being turned out at the rate of 50 barrels a day, Superintendent Kind has planned to increase the plant to double its present capacity, so that in October next the company will be able to turn out at least 1400 barrels daily.
