DENVER, May 28.—The general executive committee of organized labor, which had charge of the recent strike in Denver, to-night issued an address to the public in which it is charged that members of the Citizens' Alliance, the business men's organization, have violated the agreement made at the time the strike was declared off, refusing to reinstate their locked out employees.
