KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 1.—A message to the Times from Kansas City, Kan., by way of Leavenworth, at 2 o'clock this morning says twenty-seven men at work on the Union Pacific bridge when it went down were all drowned. It is said that many persons saw the helpless men drowning.

CALIFORNIANS FLOOD-BOUND IN MISSOURI.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 31.—Among the belated travelers who are guests of this city are a number of Los Angeles and San Francisco residents, who came on the Santa Fe yesterday morning and were unable to go on. When the water invaded the railroad station they were conducted to the Coates House, where they will wait for the flood to subside.

THIEVES WORK IN DES MOINES FLOODED AREA.

DES MOINES, Ia., May 31.—At 6 o'clock this evening the water in Des Moines River had declined fourteen inches from the maximum height of twenty-four feet, attained early this morning. Notwithstanding the steady rain that has fallen for three days, it is believed that the danger of a further rise is past.

ALL SAVED FROM DEATH.

OTTUMWA, Iowa, May 31.—All records for high water here were broken to-day, with a 21-foot 4 1/2-inch flood. Hundreds of homes in the west and south parts of Ottumwa are flooded. The work of rescuing victims occupied the day and it is reported that all have been saved.

COUNCIL GROVE'S DEAD.

EMPORIA, Kans., May 31.—Fourteen bodies are said to have been found in houses at Council Grove since the water subsided. The valley of the Neosho above here is a desolate waste.

SEVEN DEATHS REPORTED.

Not a wheel is turning in the factory district and no effort is made to open business houses. Boats afford the only means of communication between North, South and East Des Moines and the main part of the city. This is extremely painful, but it is not so for the residents of the city that is cut off from communication.

TENTS FOR THE HOMELESS.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—The War Department will assist to the extent of its power in efforts to alleviate suffering in the flooded districts of the West. Orders for this effect have been given to Major General Bates, commanding the Department of the Missouri, with headquarters at Omaha. The supply department at Leavenworth, Kas., will be availed of for the shipment of tents to the flooded localities should these be found necessary.

FOOD AND FUEL FAMINE.

The relief authorities announced this afternoon that they were confronted by a food and fuel famine. The meat markets report that they have but two or three days' stock on hand. No trains are entering the city and there is no prospect of getting relief from the East.

TWENTY DROWN IN KANSAS CITY AND VICINITY.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 31.—Twenty persons were drowned in the west bottoms during the day. The Times has published the following incomplete list of dead: JAMES DEERMAN, Armourdale. WILLIAM HERBERT, expressman, Armourdale. FIVE PERONS, three men and two women, drowned by capsizing of boat.
