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BASEBALL AGGREGATION AGAIN DEFEATED BY THE SENATORS Bobby Keeffe, the Twirler From Santa Clara College, Makes a Creditable Showing at Recreation Park. Oakland Has Many Opportunities to Win, but Fails

THE crippled baseball aggregation representing Oakland seems to have at last struck its old time gait, the pace which seems to suit it best and which always loses games. The team was no better yesterday than on the previous occasion, so the Senators took numerous trips over the rubber, scoring as many runs as they pleased. Score, 7 to 4.

It was a dismal sight to sit at Recreation Park and watch and wait through nine innings of ball that would not go in the bush league. The fans would not have been so angry about it all if the losers only got busy and ended the agony in a hurry. But this they refused to do, so it was necessary to sit and look into the horizon for an inspiration while the game ran its course of two hours and five minutes.

There was only one redeeming feature to the weird exhibition and that happened in the person of young Keeffe, the Santa Clara south who has entered Mike Fisher's fold. He was new and consequently many fans forgot their troubles while watching the youngster. His work was not to be so much admired, although he pitched good enough ball to beat two teams like Oakland.

This youngster, fresh from the study of Latin and other mysterious subjects not often heard of in the world of base hits, showed he has the right stuff in him. With a little experience he will be in a class with any other. He is tall and built a Charley Doyle. He has a word of speed and big curves, but his control yesterday was not what it might have been.

He was slow and had much to do with keeping the spectators away from the dinner table so long. The Cripples got jerry to his offerings occasionally and batted him around lively. He managed to keep the fingers well scattered and, with the exception of one instance, to remain cool in a tight place. It is the general opinion of all who saw him perform that Keeffe will do and will win many a game for Mike Fisher ere the season is a thing of the past.

The chief trouble with the Cripples was the fact that they could never get a hit when the bases were crowded or any way near crowded. Many times during the struggle did the sacks become occupied, but the Oakland batters could not come through with the necessary bingle, so every chance to win the game was simply thrown away.

Graham for the Cripples was also—even wilder than usual, and he was also eager for the Senators to hit whenever they got men on the sacks. Every man on the Sacramento team connected with the delivery of the left-hander once or twice. Young Keeffe had a bad day at third, as everything that came his way was of the torrid order and hard to handle.

Doyle is still unable to play and it is hard to say when he will be in the game again. Mike Fisher thinks, however, that he will not need him while he mixes it up with the Cripples and he will take all the seven games without difficulty. The score:

MILLER TURNS AGAINST AMMON

NEW YORK, June 10.—The trial of Robert A. Ammon, formerly counsel for William F. Miller, charged with having received \$30,000 of the money taken in by the Franklin Syndicate, knowing the same to have been stolen, was continued to-day. Miller was again on the stand and testified that when the papers and police commenced to bother him he consulted Ammon, who advised him to have the Franklin Syndicate incorporated, get back receipts given for money received and give shares in the company in place of them.

Miller said that when the exposures came Ammon advised him to go to Canada and he turned over to Ammon \$3000 in cash, a \$100,000 certificate of deposit, a check for \$10,000 and \$40,000 in bonds, all of which were deposited to Ammon's credit. Of this, Miller understood, Ammon paid Fred House, who was also his counsel, \$17,000. Miller testified that after he had been indicted Ammon again advised him to leave, and he went to Montreal, taking but \$200 with him. Ammon, the witness said, claimed to have sent \$150,000 to Montreal for Miller, but afterward said he sent only \$500. Miller said he did not receive this money. Miller said that when he met Ammon again the latter told him he had loaned \$100,000 to Seymour, Johnson & Co., a brokerage firm, and had given \$50,000 to Jimmy Ridgeway to bribe the jury in his trial which took place in April, 1901. Miller said Ammon told him that none of the money ever reached the jury or he would not have been convicted.

The event was announced to be for the colored heavyweight championship of the world.
