STALWART BEATS MADDEN'S EM TIP

Wins the Champagne Stake at Morris Park.

Only Five Two-Year-Olds Start in the Classic Event.

MORRIS PARK, Oct. 7.—The feature of the day, the far famed Champagne stake for two-year-olds, brought out only five starters, of which the Madden pair, Pulsus and The Minute Man, were favorites, but even money was laid against The Minute Man. Pulsus was beaten by Stalwart in the last hundred yards. The victory of Stalwart, however, was no surprise to those who had noted that in nearly all his races this year he had got away badly and, in some rich stakes won by other colts, really run as fast as, or faster than, the winner.
