FRANCIS PREMIER ABOUT TO RETIRE
Parisians Hear Rumor That He Intends to Resign.

Chamber of Deputies Passes Bill to Suppress Employment Bureaus.
PARIS, Nov. 3.—The reports that Premier Combes intended to resign became more persistent this afternoon, following the action of M. Jaures, the Socialist leader, in notifying the President of the Council of his intention to interpellate the Government on the subject of strikes in the northern spinning district, but M. Combes himself maintains entire silence on the subject. While the retirement of M. Combes is likely to occur later, the Premier has not yet announced his intention to do so, and there is no present indication that his retirement is imminent.

EMBASSADOR TOWER WILL PRESENT THE PHOTOGRAPH Mrs. Roosevelt Sends Portrait of Her Daughter Alice to German Dispatch Boat.
BERLIN, Nov. 3.—Embassador Tower, who recently returned here from a visit to the United States, brought with him a photograph of Miss Alice Roosevelt, presented by Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt to the officers of the German dispatch boat Alice Roosevelt in consequence of the desire expressed by them to have a portrait of the lady after whom the vessel was named. The photograph, which is a soft tone, about twelve inches long by nine inches wide, and which represents Miss Roosevelt at full length, bears her autograph.

Acres Dispute is Finally Settled. RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 3.—The Acropolis territory dispute between Bolivia and Brazil has been settled. The principal points which were under consideration in the Acropolis dispute were whether the territory beyond the tenth degree of latitude shall be Brazilian territory, Brazil to pay Bolivia \$5,000,000 and allow Bolivia the right to send Acropolis products to Brazilian points on the Amazon River.



INDIANS FLUKE THEIR PASSENGERS
Murderous Reds Scatter and Strike Out for Dakota Line.
Further Particulars Are Received of the Fight at Beaver Dams.
DOUGLAS, Wyo., Nov. 3.—County Attorney Mecum has returned from the Beaver Dams on Lightning Creek with particulars of the recent trouble with the Indians. The fight occurred Sunday evening. Sheriff Miller of Newcastle, former Sheriff Owens and a posse of eight men had followed the Sloux, who were from the Pine Ridge Agency, to the Beaver Dams with warrants for their arrest for unlawfully killing game. The Indians refused to surrender and the posse allowed them to pass, securing four additional deputies, headed off by the Indians in a valley at the Beaver Dams and demanded their surrender. The Indians, led by Charley Smith, otherwise known as Eagle Feather, without replying shot and killed Deputy Falkenburgh. The shooting then became general and Sheriff Miller was shot in the hip, dying from the wounds.
