## Victory for Lane in Almshouse Precinct.

THE finish of the count shows that the Republicans elect seven Supervisors, the Auditor, Treasurer, Tax Collector, County Clerk and City Attorney. The Democrats elect ten Supervisors, the Sheriff, Assessor, Recorder, Public Administrator, District Attorney, Coroner and the two Police Judges. The Union Labor party elects the Mayor and one Supervisor.

Returns show that Franklin K. Lane carried one precinct in the city. That precinct is the Thirtieth of the Thirtieth Assembly District and is known as the Almshouse precinct. The vote stands: Lane 78, Schmitz 55 and Crocker 42. Lane's name that swept the precinct.

The three Grand Army men nominated by the Republican convention were defeated—Horace Wilson for Supervisor, William E. Lutz for Public Administrator and General E. S. Salomon for District Attorney. Wilson and Lutz belong to George A. Thomas Post. General Salomon is a member of Garfield Post. Every veteran in the field fell on the firing line. The Babbs volunteers did not cover themselves with glory in the engagement last Tuesday. Their conduct in the field shows the danger of depending upon raw and undisciplined troops. The volunteers started to the front without supplies or ammunition. There were so many conflicting orders and so much confusion that the alignment of the forces was not established until the polls had closed and the battle was over. The roster of the army is somewhere at campaign headquarters.

### LANE'S BACKING.

The Call predicted that Schmitz would carry the Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Forty-fifth districts. He carried all these, together with the Twenty-eighth, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-ninth. Martin Kelly is a back number. He failed to carry the Twenty-eighth for Lane. As predicted in The Call, Lane did not carry one Assembly district, but it is impossible at this time to determine which contributed most to this inglorious finish, his meagre newspaper or his evening oration.

Crocker ran ahead of Lane in every Assembly district of the city but one. In the Thirtieth District Lane ran slightly ahead of his Republican competitor.

The Fortieth District wins the Republican banner. It gave Crocker more votes than it gave for Schmitz and Lane combined.

Crocker received 1946 votes, Lane 718 and Schmitz 623.

In the Forty-first District, where Crocker, Schmitz and Lane reside, the vote was light. Crocker received 1213, Schmitz 1049 and Lane 627.

Future events will determine whether the liquor dealers of San Francisco acted wisely in bringing the trade into politics. They were strongly advised by eminent dealers to keep out and withhold any kind of action that would tend to force the issue on the existing political parties of this State.

### LIQUOR INTERESTS STRONG.

The weight of the local liquor influence is shown in the vote for Thomas F. Finn, one of the candidates for Supervisor on the Union Labor ticket. The California Liquor Dealers' Association and the Royal Ark Lodge sixteen of the Supervisory candidates. The only Union Labor candidate endorsed was Thomas F. Finn, and he received 19,000 votes, or about 4000 more than the average of the Labor ticket.

Elements other than the favor of liquor dealers may have enhanced Mr. Finn's vote, but it is generally conceded that this endorsement brought him in ahead of his associates on the Labor ticket.

### WILL PETITION FOR NEW STREET CROSSINGS

Point Lobos Improvement Club to Ask Board of Public Works to Better District.

The Point Lobos Improvement Club met last night at Richmond Hall, corner of Fourth avenue and Clement street. H. U. Brandenstein presided.

A large number of the property owners of the district were present and street improvement was discussed. The advisability of narrowing the sidewalks and bituminizing Clement street from First avenue to Sixth street was discussed. Committees appointed to interview the various property owners of the street reported that they had met with much opposition on the part of some. The objections were that the levy on the property owner would be more than he could at this time stand. After much discussion the matter was laid over.

Petitions were drawn up to be presented to the Board of Public Works asking that bituminized crossings be put in at the corners of Clement and Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth avenues, and that brick cesspools be constructed at the corners above mentioned, where there are none existing now.

A petition for a new fire alarm box at the corner of Second avenue and C street will be presented to the Board of Fire Commissioners.

### Schmitz' Re-election Affects Small Army of Officeholders.

A small army of officeholders is destined to lose positions as a result of Mayor Schmitz's re-election, since he will control a majority of the members of the various boards and commissions beginning on January 8 next. The upheavals will be especially heavy in the Boards of Health and of Public Works, where Casey had formed combinations against Schmitz, who had appointed him Commissioner of Works.

Probably the first act of the new Commissioner of Works will be to form an alliance with Commissioner Herbert Schmitz, the Mayor's brother, and depose Casey as president of the Board of Works. In that event Casey will no longer be ex-officio member of the Board of Health, and Mayor Schmitz therefore will also assume control of the last named board.

In all likelihood Health Officer O'Brien will be superseded by Dr. John F. Dillon, who was defeated for Coroner. Dillon would have been appointed long ago if Casey had stood by Schmitz. Among others in the Department of Health who will feel the keen edge of the official ax are City Chemist Green, Superintendent W. J. Kelly of the Almshouse, Dr. B. McElroy, resident physician of the City and County Hospital, and Chief Surgeon
