FINE CLUBHOUSE FOR WORKINGMEN

Project Started by New York Association Nears Fruition.

Building Will Cost \$200,000 and Will Have Every Comfort.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—This city is to be the home of the most costly clubhouse for workmen in the United States.

Facilities for mental and physical culture are to be the best obtainable. A gymnasium, class rooms, lecture rooms and library are provided, and it is the intention to have regular courses of lectures, debates and studies for members.

A large ballroom will be arranged, with a stage for theatrical entertainments and musicals; while on the first floor there will be a bar and cafe, with reading and billiard room.

The Workingmen's Educational and Home Association of New York, which will carry out the project, was organized in 1896, and now has more than 1400 members.

HASTY MARRIAGE CITED AS A PROOF OF INSANITY

JUDGE INSTRUCTS JURY TO ACQUIT

Evidence Against Ex-Congressman Moody Insufficient.

Prosecution Unable to Prove the Allegations of the Indictment.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 18.—Former Congressman Moody, on trial on an indictment returned by the Federal Grand Jury charging him with wrongfully securing and withholding a letter addressed to Mrs. Margaret I. Conroy, alleged to have contained a receipt from the Comptroller of the Treasury for the final dividend of the defunct Dalles National Bank, of which Moody was president, was acquitted this evening.

Judge Bellinger interrupted the argument of District Attorney Wood with the statement to the effect that the prosecution was proceeding on grounds too far-fetched to warrant a verdict against the defendant.

Moody was his own chief witness to-day and told a story greatly at variance with that related by Mrs. Conroy, who spent most of yesterday on the witness stand.

Japanese Murderer Is Caught.

WATSONVILLE, Nov. 18.—H Isunt, the Japanese who killed his brother, was captured last evening by Officers Corr and Bassette at the Driscoll ranch, about nine miles distant from the scene of the tragedy.

Burglars Rife a Box Car.

NAPA, Nov. 18.—Burglars broke into a box car at Suisun a day or so ago and stole considerable valuable merchandise, some of which belonged to Napa merchants. Eight arrests have been made on suspicion.
