SHERIFF RAIDS. PROPERTY AT HOME. Well-Known Lawyer Is Threatened With Ejection on Order of Superior Judge Hebbard

There was chaos in the residence of Augustus D. Spivaco, a well-known attorney, at 1129 Washington street last evening. A squad of deputy sheriffs descended upon the place soon after 5 o'clock and in a short time all the furniture and equipments of the basement and first floor were piled upon the sidewalk.

The trouble is one of long standing. It appears that Mrs. Florencia Portener, a daughter of the attorney, borrowed \$10,000 from the Hibernia Savings and Loan Society in 1897. At that time it was supposed that Mrs. Portener was the sole owner of the premises and the banking company considered the property as security.
