



THREE JAPANESE DIVISIONS ADVANCING

RUSSIANS COMPLAIN TO POWERS

Firing on Red Cross Train by the Japanese Causes a Protest.

Soldiers of the Czar Are Declared to Be in Splendid Health.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 10.—Russia has protested to the Powers signatory of The Hague and Geneva conventions against the action of the Japanese in firing on the Red Cross trains from Port Arthur May 6, when of 200 sick and wounded on the cars two were struck by the Japanese bullets.

The following statement was made to-day regarding the reported epidemics at Mukden:

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Russia's protest to the United States against the action of the Japanese in firing on the Red Cross train from Port Arthur May 6 and striking two of the 200 wounded aboard, was sent to the State Department to-night by Count Cassini, the Russian Ambassador.

JAPANESE POLICY IS CLEAR CUT

Success Will Not Change the Present Purpose of Mikado's Government.

Former Minister of the Interior Speaks of the Issues at Stake.

LONDON, May 10.—Baron Suye-matsu, son-in-law of Marquis Ito and former Japanese Minister of the Interior, who lately arrived here by way of the United States, in the course of an interview to-day with reference to the fears expressed on the continent as to the effect of Japanese successes on Japan's policy after the war, declared emphatically that Japan's policy is well defined and her success will make no difference.

NEWS REACHES CASSINI.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Count Cassini, the Russian Ambassador, has received a dispatch from St. Petersburg saying that Vlceoy Alexieff telegraphed the Emperor that railroad communication with Port Arthur was restored during the night of May 9-10 and that the telegraph line is being repaired.

EDISON TO HAVE HEARING REGARDING HIS PATENTS

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KUROKI'S PLAN FOR SUCCESS

General's Object to Sever Communication With Rear of Liaoyang.

Japanese Troops Cautioned Not to Fight Against the Chinese.

LONDON, May 11.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post, under date of May 10, says that the Japanese army is advancing in three divisions—the first from Fengwangcheng toward Liaoyang, the second from Poladen and Chuchon to Yung-yaocheng, and the third from Kullien-cheng to Kullien with the object of severing communication with the rear of Liaoyang, where only small preparations for defense have been made.

The correspondent of the Times at Tokio says it appears that the capture of Fengwangcheng was effected, not by the troops which fought on the 11th, but by a mixed brigade under Major General Sasaki, which, marching eastward on April 20, crossed the Yalu at Chengseng and moved on Fengwangcheng by a mountain road.

FENGWANGCHENG OCCUPIED.

Russian Commander Notifies St. Petersburg of Jap Movements.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 10.—Lieutenant General Sakharoff, commander of the First Siberian Army Corps, in a telegram to the general staff dated May 8 says that the Japanese, having occupied Fengwangcheng, are remaining there and are making reconnaissance of the main road to Liaoyang and both flanks of the road.

MAY REACH PORT ARTHUR.

Russian Vice Admirals Are Notified That Communication Is Open.

PARIS, May 10.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo de Paris says: Vice Admiral Skrydloff and Vice Admiral Bezenkof have been notified of the resumption of communication with Port Arthur so that they may attempt to reach that place.

TAKES RED CROSS FUNDS.

Russian General Loses in Speculation, but Empress Makes Good.

BERLIN, May 10.—Die Post publishes a news agency dispatch from St. Petersburg which says that General Schwedoff lost over half a million dollars through speculation in stocks and took the money from the Red Cross treasury.

KOREANS FIRE UPON COSSACKS

Skirmish on Bank of a River Gives Opportunity to Sharpshooters.

Chinese Bandits Engage in the Strife and Attack the Russians.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 10.—The general staff has received a dispatch from Major General Karkevitch, dated May 9, which says: "On May 5 our scouts discovered at Liaoyahpuzo, fourteen miles north of Takushan, on the left bank of the Tallin River, a Japanese detachment, one regiment strong. During a fusillade with a line of Japanese sharpshooters one Cossack was killed.

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KEARNY AT POST

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The attention of the Bureau of Navigation of the Navy Department to-day was called to the official report of M. Pavloff, Russian Minister to Korea, which was gazetted in the Official Messenger, stating that the commander of the Vicksburg refused, after the engagement at Chemulpo, to take aboard the vessel wounded men from the Russian warships Variag and Korietz.

The bureau produced the following extract from the report of Commander W. A. Marshall, commanding the Vicksburg at Chemulpo, which the officials regard as a complete rebuttal: "About 12:30 p. m., February 9, both Russian vessels, Korietz and Variag, headed in toward their anchorage at full speed and as they approached it was seen that the Variag had a list to port and appeared to be on fire aft on the port quarter, a number of Japanese in pursuit, until about a mile inside of Yodollim, but not firing, as the foreign men-of-war were directed in line of fire, when they gave up the chase and rejoined their squadron outside.

At 12:50 the Variag anchored about 400 yards to the northward and westward of the Talbot, with the Elba about 600 yards to the southward of her. On learning that she had quite a number of wounded men I sent our medical officers on board to render assistance. The same was done by the Talbot, Elba and Pascal. A little later on, on its being reported that the Variag was in a sinking condition, two of our cutters and the whaleboat, with boats from the other cruisers, assisted in taking off her personnel and putting them on board the Talbot and Elba. Two Russian engineer officers were brought on board the Vicksburg and taken care of for some time and on my offering to have the Zafiro used as temporary quarters, they were taken to the Elba, where their captain detained them and declined my offer with thanks." It is pointed out by the chief of the Navigation Bureau that the Zafiro, which was tendered as a hospital ship, is a roomy naval transport and was much more suitable for the accommodations of the wounded than the little Vicksburg with her cramped quarters.

VICKSBURG INCIDENT IS EXPLAINED

Bureau of Navigation Takes Notice of Report of Russian Minister.

Record of American Commanding Officer at Chemulpo Given to Public.

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
