ARMED CITIZENS AID SHERIFF AND SOLDIERY IN EXPELLING RIOTERS FROM VICTOR DISTRICT

BLACK SEA FLEET MAY SAIL SOON

Turkey Is Said to Have Granted Permission.

Names as a Condition That Vessels Never Recross the Bosphorus.

British Foreign Office Has Not Heard of Reported Plan to Violate Treaty.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 7.—Grand Duke Alexis, commander-in-chief of the navy, according to an apparently reliable report, has obtained the permission of the Emperor to create a third Pacific squadron from the ships of the Black Sea fleet, and permission has already been obtained from Turkey to take the ships through the Dardanelles on the condition that they will not return. This squadron will be composed, according to the report, of the battleships Rostislav, Dvenadzat, Apostoloff and Tria Sviatella. It will be accompanied by torpedo-boats and destroyers and will sail for the Far East simultaneously with the Baltic squadron.



MOORS ROB WIFE OF A BRITON

Compel Woman to Give Up Rifles of Spouse.

TANGIER, June 7.—Armed Anjera Moors invaded the residence of an Englishman here to-day and compelled his wife to give up the rifles of her husband who was absent. The outrage took place in broad daylight. The British Consul demands the arrest of the tribesmen, but the Moorish officials hesitate because the perpetrators are influential.

EXPOSITION CITY'S FUNDS ARE AMPLE

SECURE WEDDING OUTFIT AT EXPENSE OF STRANGERS

CHICAGO, June 7.—After securing her wedding outfit by having the goods charged to two men of wealth, Rose Reifers, 18 years old, was arrested while passing herself off as the daughter of Theodore A. Kochs. She had ordered jewelry to the value of \$350 charged to Kochs' account. The jewelry consisted of a diamond ring and shirt stud which the young woman afterward confessed she intended to give to George Breckley of Oak Park, to whom she is engaged.

SUCCESS ATTENDS TEST OF TORPEDO-BOAT FULTON

NEWPORT, R. I., June 7.—The submarine torpedo-boat Fulton, which was sunk to the bottom of the ocean last evening for a test, remained there more than twelve hours, coming up at 11:10 o'clock to-day. The men were on duty in watches of two hours each, the remainder of the time being spent in reading, playing games and sleeping. All the members of the crew were in good condition to-day and appeared to have rested well.

Nine Drowned in Flood.

MAMERS, France, June 7.—Torrential rains flooded the water courses this evening, causing the collapse of several houses. Nine bodies were recovered and several persons are missing.

DRINK NEARLY KILLS YOUTHS

Edward Kerr and Matthew Halloran Drink Quart of Whisky on Top of Cliff

NEW YORK, June 7.—Matthew Halloran, aged 14, and Edward Kerr, aged 13, with three other boys of about the same age, obtained two bottles of whisky, climbed to the top of a rock and sat down to drink. Soon they began to shout and dance about near the edge of the cliff. Several men summoned a policeman, who called to Halloran and Kerr to come down. "Not on your life," the boys replied. A conference was held and it was decided that the only way to rescue them was by means of a rope. The policeman sent for the patrol wagon and a rope. When these arrived the officers climbed to the top of the rock, where they found three of the boys had managed to escape. Two, Halloran and Kerr, were lying unconscious. Near them was an empty quart bottle which had contained whisky. A rope was tied about the form of Halloran and he was lowered to the pavement, while a crowd which nearly blocked the street, watched. Kerr was lowered in a similar manner and an ambulance was called and the boys were hurried to Harlem Hospital. Both lapsed into insensibility. When the parents of the Halloran boy were notified that his condition was critical they summoned a priest, who administered extreme unction. The surgeons say the boys will probably die. Kerr is also in a serious condition.

INJUNCTION IS SOUGHT BY PHIPPS

Financiers Are Drawn Into a Suit for Divorce.

ENFORCED RESIGNATIONS.
