KUROPATKIN'S ARMY WILL MOVE WHEN THE TRANSFER OF SUPPLIES NOW AT NEWCHWANG IS FINISHED

Russian General Preparing for Decisive Battle of the War.

Kuroki Fails in Attempts to Turn the Flank of His Adversary.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—Over and over again I have heard anger and ridicule expressed at the fantastic reports sent from here suggesting that General Kuropatkin was being forced into a plan of campaign against his judgment. On all sides these are described as totally untrue and invented by those who wish to throw discredit upon Russia.

A thousand carts are being employed in removing stores from Newchwang to a point behind Mukden. When this is completed he will deliver a crushing blow to the enemy.

At one moment he contemplated sacrificing Newchwang, but the value of the war material there and the shortage of the same at his headquarters owing to the amount rushed into Port Arthur at the last moment made it of vital importance to hold the place until the stores were saved.

This will explain much of Kuropatkin's tactics that have hitherto been somewhat inexplicable. Kuroki's advance forces have made several attempts to creep around the Russian flank, but have been invariably repelled by the Cossacks.

EITZEL'S DEATH INVESTIGATED

Consul General Miller Forwards Report to Minister Conger.

NEWCHWANG, June 8.—The funeral of Lewis Eitzel, correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph, took place here this afternoon.

Ernest Brindle of the London Daily Mail, who was with Eitzel when he was shot, testified that his junk was unchallenged by the soldiers and was fired upon in spite of the fact that two foreigners were plainly visible at a distance of less than 100 yards.

Ernst Brindle and Eitzel were attempting to reach Port Arthur. The Russian authorities are doing all in their power to assist the American officials.

General Kondratovich placed a steam launch with twenty-five soldiers under the orders of Consul General Miller and otherwise rendered great aid in recovering the body of Eitzel.

Consul General Miller thanked General Kondratovich heartily for his kindness.

Interruption of Cable Between Korea and Japan Is Ominous.

Indicates That Japan Has Begun an Important Movement.

LONDON, June 8.—The sudden interruption of the cable between Korea and Japan is considered significant of the imminence of important operations at Port Arthur, the Japanese having taken precautions, as usual, to cut the means of communication with the outside world and thus enable their naval and military forces to work with absolute secrecy.

No attention is paid in London to rumors that the storming of the fortresses has already begun, because it is known that at the battle of Kinchoo General Oku had exhausted his ammunition and an insufficient period has elapsed during which the stores of ammunition could be renewed and siege guns brought into position.

Two regiments of Ural Cossacks, the pride and hope of the Russian cavalry, have been ordered to the front.

CUTTER PURSUES STEAMSHIP

Vessel Believed to Have a Submarine Boat on Board.

NORFOLK, June 8.—The United States authorities are worried over the suspicious actions of the Norwegian steamship Fortuna, which sailed from this port several days ago for "Cork direct."

It is reported the Fortuna was anchored in Princess Bay, near Port Amboy, and finally sailed away in a mist with what appeared to be a submarine boat lashed on her deck and which gave her a heavy list to port.

Yesterday several men visited the custom-house, secured all the information about her sailing and clearing papers and hastily embarked on a steamship for Old Point. There they learned on a "yacht" supposed to have been a revenue cutter.

It is stated the Fortuna has on her deck the submarine boat Protector, built at Bridgeport for Japan.

OUTPOST ENGAGEMENTS

Cavalry Forces in Constant Touch Near Fengwangcheng.

LIAOYANG, June 8.—Unimportant engagements continue to take place on the Fengwangcheng road between the Moien Mountains and the Japanese positions. They are principally between Japanese cavalry and the Russian advance posts.

The Russians had retaken Salmatza, which the Japanese had previously occupied, and the Japanese are occupying Pulantien (about forty miles north of Port Adams).

CREDITS CHINESE REPORT

Russian Admiralty Believes Japan Has Lost a Battleship.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—The Admiralty is convinced that either the Japanese battleship Yamashiro or the battleship Shikishima has been lost off Tainwan. This belief is based on Chinese reports which have heretofore proved reliable.

EIGHT SHELLS HIT GUNBOAT

Japanese Craft Damaged During Attack Upon Port Arthur.

TOKIO, June 8.—Four Japanese gunboats which made a close reconnaissance of Port Arthur harbor at midnight on June 6 for the purpose of examining the entrance were exposed to a severe cannonade. Gunboat No. 4 was hit eight times and sustained some damage.

One of her sailors was killed and two others were wounded.

CREWS FOR BALTIC FLEET

Eight Thousand Men of the Russian Naval Reserve Called Out.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—The crews of the Baltic fleet have been completed. Eight thousand men and officers of the naval reserve were taken from six provinces. The remainder of the naval reserves were not called out. Grand Duke Alexis, the high admiral, inspected the ships at Libau and the Emperor will visit them shortly.

Mysterious Japanese Movements

LIAOYANG, June 8.—The Japanese have evacuated their position near Vafangow. The neighboring mountains are deserted and the recently constructed intrenchments empty. Japanese mounted scouts even are no longer seen and the Russian patrols have failed to locate any Japanese as far as Nafangkau.

EXPECTS IMPORTANT NEWS

Russian Official Hints That Decisive Movements Are Impending.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—One of the most prominent officials of the War Office expected within three days.

The manager of the Baltic works has received a message from the branch at Port Arthur which he says was sent by wireless telegraph by way of Chifu. The message announced that the Russian battleship Pobieda, which had a hole thirty feet wide in her side, is proceeding satisfactorily.

BANK FAILURE INVOLVES NAME OF THE EMPRESS

Charitable Undertakings Financed Through German Institution That Has Collapsed.

BERLIN, June 8.—The painful impression made by the scandalous failure of the Pomeranian Mortgage Bank was heightened by the knowledge that the Empress' charitable undertakings were partly financed through that institution.

Three Hundred and Twenty Japanese Killed in Wafendien Fight.

Czar Orders Two Regiments of Famous Ural Cossacks to the Front.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—The only news received to-day was that of an engagement at Wafendien, the Japanese having 320 killed. They retired to Tsenchu, apparently believing the Russians were advancing in force.

Transports, twenty-five in number, with full munitions and stores, are awaiting the clearance of mines from Tallenwan.

Here military critics are thoroughly nonplused at the situation and all agree that no immediate move will be made toward the rescue of Port Arthur and that the Japanese retreat is in the nature of a feint.

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WIFE, CHILDREN AND OWN GONE

Chicago Man Is Searching for His Eloping Spouse and His Hoarded Savings

COMING TO CALIFORNIA

Golden State Officials Are Asked to Watch for the Woman and Companion

CHICAGO, June 8.—James Cantant of Melrose Park is searching for his wife, his two little girls and his savings, amounting to \$1000. He declares that Charles Yukewich is responsible for the disappearance of wife, children and money. He believes they have gone to San Francisco and the local police have asked the California authorities to look out for them.

"I am particularly desirous of finding the children and the \$1000. As for the others, I am not so particular," said Cantant, when he told of the disappearance to the police.

According to Cantant, Yukewich went to Melrose Park some weeks ago and, shortly after his arrival, became acquainted with Cantant's wife. The man called at his house many times, but he had not the slightest idea that his wife had formed an attachment for Yukewich. The news was first broken to him when he hid to his home yesterday at noon and found no luncheon prepared. He then searched the house for his wife and children, but they were missing. He hunted for money as was fruitless as was his search for his family. He immediately told the police of the disappearance.

CLERGYMAN IS KILLED BY KICK OF A PONY

Well Known Montana Minister Attempts to Subdue Animal and Is Fatally Injured.

BUTTE, Mont., June 8.—While the Rev. Allen Rodgers, one of the best known Methodist ministers in Montana, was attempting to subdue a fractious cayuse at Ulca yesterday, the pony whirled on the divine and, making a jump, kicked the clergyman in the chest of the stomach. Rodgers was found in a senseless condition in the stall of the wild animal and death ensued several hours later.

Rev. Mr. Rodgers has occupied pulpits in this State for the past twenty years and has distinguished himself very prominently in the work of the church. He was also a well known Mason.

FORMER SOCIETY MAN IN JAIL AT SAN JOSE

Paul T. Wilkes of Tonopah Is Arrested on a Charge of Issuing a Fictitious Check.

SAN JOSE, June 8.—Trouble over a slight draft has landed Paul T. Wilkes, a Tonopah newspaper man, promoter, duelist and former society man in the County Jail. The prisoner claims to be the divorced husband of Mrs. H. Leroy Jones, the society woman who created a big sensation in New York a few weeks ago by disappearing.

On Sunday last Wilkes gave the proprietors of St. Luke's Sanitarium a slight draft for \$50 drawn on his brother, Thomas W. Wilkes of Los Angeles. The check was cashed at the National Bank of Los Angeles and returned dishonored because Thomas Wilkes could not be found. In the meantime Wilkes went to Santa Cruz for a few days and returned last evening to the sanitarium. A warrant had been issued for his arrest for issuing a fictitious check and he was arrested.

Wilkes declares that his arrest is all a mistake and exhibits a telephone number, either telling him to draw on him for whatever money he needs. He says that the only reason the draft was not cashed was because the bank people did not find his brother.

Wilkes says he has spent three fortunes. He claims to be the son of Rev. Eliza Purper Wilkes, a Unitarian minister of Los Angeles, and Judge Wilkes, a former jurist of that place. Wilkes also claims to be the hero of a duel with Warren Ratcliffe McVey at Fort Lee a few years ago. Two bullet scars exhibited to bear out the latter statement.

GIRL MAKES QUICK CHOICE BETWEEN RIVAL LOVERS

Two Licenses to Wed Her Issued Within Twenty-Four Hours by Auditor of Seattle.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 8.—Two marriage licenses were secured within twenty-four hours by rival lovers seeking to wed pretty Alice Patterson, the 17-year-old daughter of Mrs. W. A. Thompson of 1006 Broadway avenue.

W. A. Thompson, an upholsterer, led the assault upon the etidell of his lady love Tuesday by appearing at her home with a marriage license. His would-be mother-in-law, however, sent him defeated from the house without seeing Alice, who had ceased to love him since he had courted her two months ago. In his anger and disappointment the young man left his license behind.

Bright and early this morning W. A. Thompson called on the Auditor and said to issue no more licenses for the marriage of his daughter unless he or Mrs. Thompson appeared in person to give consent, as the girl was under age. A few hours later, however, C. P. Vincent, aged 23 years, who is employed in a cigar-store, appeared in the Auditor's office and asked for a license to marry Alice Patterson. Mrs. Thompson, mother of the girl, accompanied him to give her consent. The marriage ceremony was performed by Dean Perine later.

CAPTAIN OF THE AMERICAN PRAISES THE NEW HARBOR

Experiences No Difficulty Sailing Big Vessel Through the Channel Up to San Diego Wharf.

SAN DIEGO, June 8.—The steamer American of the Hawaiian line arrived to-day direct from New York with a cargo of about 7000 tons, of which 1800 tons is for Southern California ports. With the Government cuts made during the past ten months she was able not only to cross the bar but come through the new channel in the middle ground without let or hindrance.

Captain Colcord is loud in his praise of the value of the new Government work to the harbor and says that the big Texan, which will be the next of the line to arrive here, will come through as easy as did the previous vessel. Captain Colcord reports that he caught no sight of the missing steamer Conemaugh.

APPEALS TO THE LAW TO SECURE HIS BRIDE

Husband Alleges That Parents of His Wife Are Illegally Restraining Her of Her Liberty.

SAN DIEGO, June 8.—While his pretty young wife is detained at the home of her unfeeling parents, John Alumbaugh, the young man of Oceanview who eloped with Edna Adrian Donnelly of Escondido recently, is making strenuous efforts to secure her liberty. Alumbaugh applied to the Superior Court to-day for a writ of habeas corpus, claiming that his wife is being illegally imprisoned and held at the home of her parents. Superior Judge Conklin signed an order commanding Mr. and Mrs. Donnelly to bring their daughter into court to-morrow to show cause why she should not be given her freedom.

Judge Rhodes to Be Banqueted

SAN JOSE, June 8.—A banquet will be given shortly by the Santa Clara County Bar Association in honor of Judge A. L. Rhodes, one of the most prominent jurists of the State. Judge Rhodes, who for sixteen years was a member of the State Supreme Court, is now Judge of the Superior Court of this county. The time and place for holding the banquet has not yet been agreed upon, but committees have been appointed and are now at work on the matter.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL IS ACCUSED OF FORGERY

Money Lender Swears Out a Warrant for the Arrest of a Well-Known Educator of Phoenix.

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 8.—A warrant was issued to-night on the complaint of W. E. Fickas, charging R. L. McDonald, superintendent of the Phoenix High School and the Phoenix Grammar School, with the crime of forgery.

McDonald is accused of having attached the signatures of the school trustees to orders on the County Superintendent for warrants for salary to the amount of more than \$600. Genuine orders covering the same period of service had been presented to the Superintendent, and the warrants issued and cashed. The spurious orders were given to Fickas, a money lender, to secure a loan of \$600. McDonald was recently employed as principal of the grammar schools for another year. He left here a week ago, saying he was going East.

THINKS MURDERED MAN LIVED AT SANTA ROSA

C. E. Gardner Identifies Body Found Under Power Plant at Bakersfield as That of George E. Peery.
