

FREMONT COVER IS REOPENED

Work in Rich Sutter Creek Mine Is to Be Resumed With a Non-Union Force

TROUBLE MAY OCCUR

Strikers Are Active, but Employers Are Prepared to Resist Any Overt Acts

SUTTER CREEK, July 17.—At the Fremont cover, one of the largest mines in Amador County a strike occurred about three months ago. The cause of the walk-out then was the refusal of the company to discharge a certain man working underground who had refused to join the union.

It has been known for some time that the company intended to work the mine at any cost, as the property is too valuable to allow it to deteriorate.

At the Fremont cover mine a barb wire fence was put around the entire property soon after the strike occurred.

The Japanese, the general says, have occupied Kichinba. They are still fortifying the passes between Sonshui and Motien.

FLOOD RUSHES DOWN VALLEY

Bursting of a Reservoir at Scottsdale, Pa., Turns Loose a Great Torrent

Populace Escapes to High Ground Before Water Descends Upon the Homes

SCOTTSDALE, Pa., July 17.—With the roar of Niagara the new reservoir of the Citizens' Water Company burst at midnight and more than 300,000,000 gallons of water rushed down the valley, sweeping all before it and inundating crops and wrecking buildings in its path.

It was discovered about nine o'clock that the dam was in danger of breaking through the valley to warn the populace.

The damage to the machinery and reservoir alone will amount to at least \$50,000.

When the torrent swept down upon the valley buildings were torn from their foundations and carried on the crest of the great wave like so many tubs.
