


DESERTED BY THE BRIG GENEVA IS CARRIED CLOSE TO POINT REYES

Daybreak Finds the Little Windjammer Under the Shadow of the Rocky Promontory, Where She Remains All Day Awaiting the Breeze Which Never Comes--Is Not Thought to Be in Danger

The brig Geneva, which left here July 20 for Port Blakely, is having a hard time to get away from the coast and out among the kind of ocean breezes suited to her mode of travel. When day broke yesterday morning the United States Weather Bureau observers stationed at Point Reyes discovered the Geneva anchored about 150 yards from the promontory. The weather was hazy and for once there was nothing doing in the zephyr line at the windiest cape in America. All day long the Geneva rolled in the swell, the rattle of her cordage and spars making up to the men at the weather station for the unwonted absence of the wind.

Mongolia Changes Masters. The Pacific Mail Company's big liner Mongolia was placed on the Hunters Point dry dock yesterday for the purpose of having a chain, picked up in the Orient, taken from one of her propellers. Captain J. H. Rinder has been granted sick leave by the Pacific Mail Company and when the Mongolia leaves here July 29 she will be in command of Captain Porter, a sailor well known on the Pacific coast.

Arabs Is Almost Ready. The new towboat Arabs, which has been built by the Fulton Iron Works for the Pacific Mail Company, is almost ready for service. She has not had her official trial yet, but the builders had her out for a spin the other day and the new boat showed her ability to sail all around the specifications by which her owners will judge the latest addition to their fleet.

REPLACES PLACE

Santa Clara Now Leads for Position Now Occupied by Quarantine Officer Crow

OBTAINS INDORSEMENT

Cannery and Horticulturists Sign Petition Asking That He Be Named for the Post

Horticultural Commissioner Ehrhorn of Santa Clara County will probably succeed Alexander Crow as quarantine officer against insect pests dangerous to trees and vines in California. The appointment has not yet been made by Ellwood Cooper, State Horticultural Commissioner, but the news from San Jose, derived from trustworthy sources, leaves little doubt that Ehrhorn is the man. He has obtained the indorsement of S. F. Lieb of San Jose and of the leading fruit growers and cannery of the State. Ehrhorn has conferred with Horticultural Commissioner Cooper and has practically been assured that he is the leading candidate for the place. He was required to get the indorsement of men of weight engaged in horticulture and viticulture or in the interests that are bound up with these industries, and in this he has succeeded. From the first Ehrhorn has been favorably mentioned. His duties in Santa Clara County have been principally those of county entomologist. He has, however, had experience in the quarantine work that will be called upon to perform, having formerly been in the service of the State. It is supposed that the appointment of Ehrhorn will be announced in a few days, as Mr. Crow will depart for Hawaii under a five years' contract at \$5000 per annum about the middle of next month, and will require some time to attend to his own private affairs before he leaves. The position that Mr. Ehrhorn will occupy pays \$200 per month, and it is considered that it is important to the fruit interests of the State.

MOTORMAN EXONERATED FOR A CHILD'S DEATH. Coroner's Jury Charges W. S. Gloster With Manslaughter for the Killing of J. A. Funk.

In the inquest held yesterday by Coroner Leland on the body of James Adams, the 4-year-old child who was run over and killed by an electric car on Mission street, between Eighth and Ninth, on July 16, the jury returned a verdict exonerating E. A. Lindsay, the motorman, from all blame. The jury charged with manslaughter for the death of J. A. Funk on July 17. The evidence was that Gloster struck Funk a heavy blow in the face with his fist, the blow fracturing his skull. Bystanders followed Gloster, who had walked rapidly away, and procured his arrest.

The pawnbroker, who is named in the instruction, is a man who has been in the habit of borrowing from him by one Carl Schwartz, his designer and maker, whose ostensible purpose was to use it as a model for the manufacture of a duplicate. Soon after Mr. Schwartz abruptly left the city and he was discovered that for some time prior to his departure the jewelry business conducted by him on Market street was in shabby condition and that he had pawned for \$50 the badge lent to him by Mr. Laws, telling the pawnbroker that its owner needed the money to meet some pressing obligations and was ashamed to dispose of the badge himself. The pawnbroker in whose possession the emblem was found refused to give it up unless he received the principal sum with interest that he had loaned on it and Mr. Laws appealed to the courts to aid him in its recovery.

Adolph Goldman, who shot with intent to kill R. W. Snow, a former Mayor of Oakland, was sentenced to the Superior Court by Judge Mogan, with bail fixed at \$2000. It was the frowzy condition of the woman's coiffure that inspired both Judge Fritz and Assistant District Attorney Harris to utter the same ban mot simultaneously. "Your name?" said Harris. "Topsy Burns," was the woman's answer. Instantly, as if with a single voice, both bench and bar exclaimed, "Why isn't it Topsy Turvy?" Miss Burns calmly corralled her disordered tresses and replied not. Bailiff Conlan declared she had not seen the joke.

Young W. Casteel, who shot R. W. Durham, manager of a business college on Golden Gate avenue, is confined to his home with a severe attack of eczema, and said eczema being a repelling disease Judge Mogan prudently declined an invitation to conclude the preliminary hearing of the case at the sick man's bedside. The examination will be resumed in open court on September 5. Patrolman McHugh arrested Ira C. Hayes for conducting a poker game at 1219 1/2 Fillmore street, and at the same time in six young men who were on the premises and charged them with gambling before Judge Conlan. However, the officer could not swear that the defendants were not holding a prayer meeting or playing old maid, and dismissal was promptly ordered.

AVERS THAT HIS ARREST WAS MADE MALICIOUSLY. A. Neuvohner Swears to a Complaint Against Thomas Clay and Will Sue for Damages.

A. Neuvohner, 526 Sixth street, yesterday swore to a complaint before Police Judge Fritz charging Thomas Clay with maliciously procuring a warrant for his arrest on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Neuvohner says that he will also sue Clay for damages in the civil courts. The warrant was sworn to by Clay for Neuvohner's arrest before Police Judge Conlan on July 2. Clay, who had an office in the Crossley building, alleged that Neuvohner induced him to purchase his one-half interest in the "Little Hungary" roadhouse on the San Leandro road for \$800, which was paid to Neuvohner at the Western Bank. The day following Clay had to pay \$150 rent. He declared that instead of the roadhouse paying a good percentage on the investment the daily receipts did not exceed the rent. When the case was called in Judge Conlan's court Clay failed to appear to prosecute and after two continuances it was dismissed for lack of prosecution. Neuvohner alleges that Clay's statements were false. Clay is an Englishman, but claims, it is said, to be a grandson of Henry Clay, the famous statesman. He is thought to have left the city.

He has an appeal before the Superior Court against a prior conviction on a similar charge and says he believes it will be sustained, as his application for examination has been before the board for the last two years.
