FIGHT RESULTS FROM FEUD

Fruitvale Editor, Fearing Plot, Secures Warrants for Wholesale Arrests

WAS KEPT A PRISONER

Colonel Frank Lynch Says Carl Hartwick Picketed His Home With Shotgun

A feud of nearly two years' standing among some of the residents of Fruitvale, which has several times resulted in arrests and battles in court, has again broken out with renewed violence.

Already three men have been arrested on charges of disturbing the peace, and warrants are out for two more, who are wanted on the same charge.

The men arrested this afternoon are: E. L. Blackman, Eugene Dean and Carl Hartwick. Constable Morris Lane is now searching for the other two, C. Stickney and Michael Carroll.

Lynch says that last night the five men named came to the Satro Park Hotel and after calling him to the door, abused him in violent terms and ended by exhibiting revolvers and threatening his life.

The origin of the present trouble dates back nearly two years to a fight between Blackman and a man named Lane over the lease of a piece of property in Fruitvale, which was used by Blackman as a wood and coal yard.

A number of the residents of Fruitvale took sides in the row and the feud has been intermittently carried on ever since.
