

From Siskiyou Down to San Diego COUNTIES WIE in Paying Honor to President

LITTLE IS LEFT FOR DEMOCRATS Their Colors Deserted Even by the Old Standbys.

Republicans Triumph Everywhere

Of the counties of the State all but one are in the Roosevelt column and when the final figures are compiled even that one, Colusa, may move from its isolated position. The counties vied with each other in their efforts to roll up great pluralities for Roosevelt, but Los Angeles, San Francisco and Alameda cut out a pace the others could not follow. Such counties as Glenn, Merced and Tulare, which are old Democratic standbys, forsook the cause of their fathers to join in the great demonstration for Roosevelt.

AMADOR COUNTY.

JACKSON, Nov. 9.—Complete semi-official returns of Amador County give Roosevelt 1279, Parker 909; for Associate Justice—Lorigan 1150, Dooling 929; Congressman—Gillett 573, Caminetti 1498; Assemblyman—McKenney 1206, Messenger 981. John Strohm (I.), for Supervisor of Township No. 1, is elected by 168 majority over New man (D.). In District No. 2, Amick (R.) defeated Clifton by 92. In District No. 4, Briner (D.) is elected by 65 over M. Brann (R.). The Board of Supervisors stands two Democrats, two Republicans and one Independent.

BUTTE COUNTY.

OROVILLE, Nov. 9.—Approximate returns for Butte give Roosevelt 830 over majority, McKinley (R.) about 400 majority, Loring and Gates (R.) for the Assembly, 1000. Two Republicans, C. H. Brown and C. E. Porter, are elected Supervisors. One district is still in doubt.

COLUSA COUNTY.

COLUSA, Nov. 9.—The vote of Colusa County shows: Roosevelt 852, Parker 906; McKinley 720, Bell 1144, Weyand 1075, Geis 757. The San Francisco seawall act and amendments Nos. 2, 9, 17 and 28 were carried. Nos. 4 and 11 were defeated. W. A. Vann (D.) was elected Supervisor in the Second District, J. E. Rathbun (R.) was elected in the Third and J. C. Campbell (R.) in the Fourth.

CONTRA COSTA COUNTY.

MARTINEZ, Nov. 9.—Complete election returns in Contra Costa County show a sweeping victory for the Republicans. The entire ticket was elected without exception. The plurality for Roosevelt is 1592. In 1900 the plurality for McKinley was 616. The county has been wrested from the control of a Democratic Board of Supervisors. The figures for the different candidates are as follows: Roosevelt 2855, Parker 1264, Knowland 2743, McPike 1260, Belshaw 2312, Randall 1956; for Supervisor of the Second District—Harris (D.) 290, Buchanan (R.) 252, Demartini (D.) 140; Fifth District—Trythall (R.) 446, Wightman (D.) 260. Ellis' majority for Assemblyman is about 2000.

EL DORADO COUNTY.

PLACERVILLE, Nov. 9.—Returns are in from 34 of the 35 precincts of El Dorado County and show the vote to be as follows: Roosevelt 1243, Parker 867; for Congressman—Gillett (R.) 1085, Caminetti (D.) 1061; for Assemblyman—Duryea (R.) 1169, Livingston (D.) 950.

FRESNO COUNTY.

FRESNO, Nov. 9.—Roosevelt has carried this county by about 2000 votes. One precinct of six votes was carried by the socialists. Returns complete from sixty-four of the seventy-nine precincts in the county show that the Democrats have elected two Supervisors and the Republicans one, besides the two Assemblymen, Drew and Chandler; for the Supreme Court—Dooling 2795, Lorigan 4590; for Congressman—Conley 8926, Needham 4428; for Assemblyman—Smith 1857, District—Graham 1350, Chandler 2148; Sixty-first—Brickley 1820, Drew 2224.

GLENN COUNTY.

WILLOWS, Nov. 9.—For the first time in its history Glenn County shows a majority for the Republican national ticket. Semi-official returns give the total vote as follows: Roosevelt 828, Parker 815; for Associate Justice—Dooling (D.) 759, Lorigan (R.) 738; for Congress—Bell (D.) 975, McKinley (R.) 678; for the Assembly—Geis (D.) 899, Weyand (R.) 729, William M. Finch (R.) defeated Fieley (I.) for Judge of the Superior Court by 267.

KERN COUNTY.

BAKERSFIELD, Nov. 9.—With the exception of one Supervisorial district, the Fifth, the Republicans of this county have swept everything before them and there is the greatest consternation in Democratic circles, as this is the first time in its history that the county has given a Republican Presidential candidate a majority. With the exception of a few outlying precincts, the returns are complete and show that the county has given Roosevelt a plurality of at least 530 votes. Smith, for Congress, 2097, for Assembly, and Bennett for Superior Judge, have received majorities ranging from 135 to 300. Jastro, for Supervisor, was the only Democrat elected. He carried every precinct, 2 to 1.

KINGS COUNTY.

HANFORD, Nov. 9.—Following is the total vote of Kings County: For the Assembly—J. F. Pryor (D.) 926, J. H. Fox (R.) 884; for Congress—Lorigan (D.) 620; Needham (R.) 1110; for Associate Justice—Dooling (D.) 638, Conley (R.) 1057. Parker received 592 votes and Roosevelt 1110. The seawall act was favored here 42 to 204. All the amendments were defeated.

LAKE COUNTY.

LAKEPORT, Nov. 9.—Complete returns for Lake County give Roosevelt 624, Parker 592, McKinley 536, Bell 771, Neyand 609, Geis 655.

LOS ANGELES COUNTY.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9.—Complete returns from Los Angeles city and county give Roosevelt a plurality over Parker of 20,812. McLachlan (R.),

RESULT PLEASES GOVERNOR PARDEE

Executive Congratulates the Voters of California on Their Display of Common Sense at the Polls

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 9.—In an interview to-day Governor George C. Pardee expressed his gratification at the sweeping Republican victory in the following words:

"I am not surprised that this State has gone even beyond the fondest estimates in the indorsement of President Theodore Roosevelt and the policies of the Republican party. What else could it consistently do? The people of California have simply shown their hard common sense in yesterday's vote. To have voted against the policy of protection would have invited disaster to our most cherished interests. On this issue there was but one thing to do and we did it.

"I am especially pleased, also, that on the issue of the personality of President Roosevelt, his motives, his strength of character and his general trustworthiness we have pronounced ourselves unmistakably, not only by an unprecedented vote for the Republican Electors, but also by sending to his support a Republican Congressional delegation.

"Political conditions in California are now just what they ought to be and what we hope they will always continue to be."

TRINITY COUNTY. WEAVERVILLE, Nov. 9.—Roosevelt's majority here is 71, Gillett's 61, Selvage's 71, Cole's 73.

TULARE COUNTY. VISALIA, Nov. 9.—For the first time in its history Tulare County has gone Republican. The vote stands: Roosevelt 2167, Parker 1610. S. C. Smith (R.) defeated W. T. Lucas (D.) by about 500 for Congress. W. B. Wallace (R.) was re-elected Judge over J. A. Allen (R.) by 85 votes. George Birkenhauer (I.) was elected Supervisor in the Third District.

VENTURA COUNTY. VENTURA, Nov. 9.—Complete returns in Ventura County give Roosevelt 1999, Parker 842, Debbs 19, Swallow 54; for Associate Justice—Lorigan 1800; Dooling 915; for Congress—Smith (R.) 1934, Lucas (D.) 907; for State Senator—Greenwell (R.) 1905, Orena (D.) 962; for Assemblyman—Perkins (R.) 2030, Moultrie (D.) 825.

PRESIDENT DELUGED WITH GOOD WISHES

Thousands of Messages Reach White House.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—President Roosevelt was overwhelmed with congratulations to-day. They were presented by many people in person and were received by mail and by telegraph from every State and from almost every city in the country. Thousands of telegrams already have been received and they are coming yet in an undiminished flood. It will practically be impossible for the President and Secretary Loeb to acknowledge each message in accordance with the usual custom at the White House, but President Roosevelt desires it to be understood that he appreciates to the fullest the expression of his friends and would be glad if it were possible for him personally to greet and thank every one of them.

The President said to-day that he felt that his announcement that he would not accept another nomination would prevent, during the next four years, any misunderstanding of his actions, personal or official. This afternoon a delegation of prominent residents of Washington was received by the President. The delegation was entirely non-partisan. James L. Norris, the Democratic national committeeman for the district, and other Democrats joining in the cordial demonstrations for Roosevelt. Norris said the Democracy had made as glorious a campaign as it could against him, but now that the contest was history he desired to say that he, in common with other Democrats, shared in the kindly feelings for the President and in the good wishes for his future success.

The President has received the following cablegram from Emperor William: "NEUE PALAIS, Nov. 9.—President Roosevelt, U. S. A. Washington: Sincerest congratulations. May heaven give you prosperity. Tuum quod bonum felix faustumque sit populo Americano."

A free translation of the Latin in the above cablegram is as follows: "May your good administration be happy and prosperous to the American people."

GERMANS HAIL THE NEWS. BRITISH PRESS PLEASED. BELIEVES ROOSEVELT'S ELECTION STRENGTHENS ANGLO-SAXON TIES.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The afternoon newspapers adopted a congratulatory telegram to President Roosevelt as describing with "accuracy and comprehension" the result of the election in the United States. Such headings as "A Vote of Confidence" and "Roosevelt's Triumph" mark all the editorial headlines.

The election is regarded by all the afternoon papers as a pledge that America will play her part in the solution of all international questions, upon the side making for justice and the development of the human race. It is "affording a guarantee that Great Britain's present relations with America will not only be maintained, but probably will be strengthened."

EFFECTS HIS ESCAPE BY A CLEVER RUSE. Logan Disguises Himself as a Prospector and Leaves Hole-in-the-Wall County.

THERMOPOLIS, Wyo., Nov. 9.—Sheriff Fenton of Big Horn County and posse, with Sheriff Stough of Fremont, have returned from the chase after Harvey Logan and his gang of Cody bank robbers and reports that Logan, by the boldest piece of daring, outwitted the officers and made his escape out of the country last Sunday. Logan, disguised as a prospector, with an old pack mule loaded with tools and provisions, tramped out of the Hole-in-the-Wall county past two posses and made his way to Casper, where he took a train.

The balance of the gang split up, two disappearing completely and two more doubling back in the mountains two miles from Thermopolis. The latter are well known to the officers and will be effected in a few days. One of these men was with Logan in the descent on the bank.

EXTEND THE "COW" LIMITS.—The Supervisors' Health Committee yesterday expressed its intention to present an ordinance providing for the extension of the so-called "cow" limits, within which it is prohibited to keep more than two cows per acre. The committee directed the clerk to notify the owners of all big ranches within the city limits of its intention, so that they may make preparations to move outside of the county, it being the opinion of the committee that big ranches are nuisances that should be abated.

MONITOR WYOMING RUNS ASHORE IN THICK FOG. Two Plates Are Sprung and the Vessel Will Have to Go on the Drydock.

SEATTLE, Nov. 9.—Leaving Bremerton to-day for target practice, the United States monitor Wyoming, Captain Coleman, in an exceptionally thick fog ran ashore on Point White, Port Orchard Narrows, and two miles out from the Puget Sound navy-yard. Two plates are reported sprung, causing a leak, which flooded two compartments. The vessel pulled off after being hung up for about three hours and returned to the navy-yard. She will, it is said, have to go into the drydock.

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TO Carry Mail to Honolulu. WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—An announcement is made by the Postoffice Department of contracts awarded for carrying the mail from San Francisco to Honolulu with the Pacific Mail Steamship Company at \$15,000 per annum.
