

CLAIMS HIS MIND IS IN CONDITION TO ACT WITH IMPARTIALITY AS TO DEFENDANT

Foreman Andrews of Grand Jury Tells of Unsuccessful Grill of Chan Cheung

IS QUESTIONED BY BUDD

Claims His Mind Is in Condition to Act With Impartiality as to Defendant

Further argument on the challenge to the Grand Jury in regard to the indictment against Chan Cheung, charging him with the murder of Tom Yick of the Chinese Education Society, was heard by Judge Lawlor yesterday morning.

Foreman Andrews, in answer to questions by Attorney James H. Budd, admitted that the object of taking Chan Cheung from the hotel and locking him in a room for over forty hours was to get from him, if possible, the admission that he was the go-between in regard to the bribery fund supplied by Chinese gamblers for police protection.

Andrews said he did mention to Chan about the murder of Tom Yick, and that he presided when the decision was reached to indict him. He did not vote, as he told the other Grand Jurors that he had reasons why it might disqualify him.

The case was continued till Saturday.

Everybody is pleased with the information that it will not be long before the vessels of the Pacific squadron, under command of Admiral Goodrich, will be anchored off the hotel.


The life saving crew responded to her signal of distress and one of Crowley's launches stood by the schooner for several hours waiting for her off.

John Kay Declares That His Employer Wrote and Destroyed Many Wills

CLAIMS HE WAS CLOSE SERVANT SAYS THAT SANTA CLARA PIONEER WAS TOO STINGY TO BUY A DRINK

Servant Says That Santa Clara Pioneer Was Too Stingy to Buy a Drink

"I got tired of witnessing wills for him," declared John Kay, former valet of J. Alexander Yoell, in Judge Kerrigan's court yesterday.

Kay testified that his master seemed to take a delight in writing wills, only to destroy them and write others. This is one of the reasons that the valet, introduced by the contestants to prove that Yoell was not of sound mind when he made the will in favor of the children of his first wife, thinks the Santa Clara pioneer was insane.

All sorts of suspicions regarding the character of both wives clouded the old man's mind during his last years, according to Kay. The valet relates an incident that happened near the Cliff House shortly before the father of the two families died.

On cross-examination by D. M. Delmas, Kay testified that Yoell often declared that the children of his second wife were only waiting for him to die, so that they could get his property by proving that he was of unsound mind.
