

THE BLOOD IS SHED IN STRIKES AND LABOR DISORDERS Add to the Roster of Strike Victims.

TROOPS SENT TO QUELL RISINGS

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 8.—For the moment the startling crime in Helsinki has withdrawn attention from the strike situation throughout Russia.

The men employed in three St. Petersburg factories threatened to walk out on the eve of the strike in this instance, which was over strike pay, was settled at a conference.

The Central Committee of the Russian Social Democratic Workers' party has issued a violent proclamation, which has been widely circulated in the factories of St. Petersburg.

The proclamation bitterly assails the authorities to array themselves under the red flag of the Social Democracy and prepare for an armed demonstration of the January demonstrations.

In order to gain victory we must organize a vast workers' army. Then again will we stand for the Russian Revolution.

Father Gopon, the leader of the workmen of St. Petersburg in the affair of January 22, is now known to be in Switzerland.

Governor General Trepoft has ordered the university to instruct all professors in universities and teachers in schools of St. Petersburg to inform their students that academic anarchy must cease.

The following proposals for dealing with the labor problem have been framed by Finance Minister Kokovlev and approved by the Emperor.

The Ministers advocate the necessity of allowing workmen to participate in matters for the improvement of their lot. He believes certain organizations ought to be permitted, and suggests that the hospital and sick funds be jointly administered and supported by employers and men.

The Minister suggests a bureau of representatives of employers and workmen to confer for the settlement of disputes as to wages and on other questions affecting the amelioration of workmen's conditions.

The Minister believes it is possible to reduce the working day to ten hours, with nine hours for night work, and to fix an eventful date for the introduction of an eight-hour day.

Manufacturers would be allowed to carry on work on holidays, but would be bound to give the men four free days each month. Special measures should be adopted to restrict abuses in the direction of overtime and to revise the laws concerning strikes and breaches of contract.

The Minister points out that the existing law regards strikes not as economic movements, but as breaches of social order, and considers that the Government should adopt the Western European point of view.

It is understood that General Trepoft is likely to become Minister of the Interior shortly, or fill the especially created post of Minister of Police.
