

ENGLAND'S CHAMPION LIGHT HEAVYWEIGHT ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

WHITE TRAVELS TO FRANCE TO MEET HIS MANAGER

Has Great Respect for the Native Son, but Believes He Will Outpoint Latter

SEASICK ON THE BOAT

Britisher Wants to Build Up Before He Starts to Train for the Conflict

NEW YORK, March 20.—Jabez White, the lightweight champion pugilist of England, finally arrived to-day on the overdue steamer Cedric.

White was accompanied by Charley Mitchell, former heavyweight champion, who will act as his manager while he is in this country.

The severity of the trip has left Jabez slightly pale, but a clutch at his arm would convince any one that he is a champion athlete of some kind.

To a Call representative who met him at the pier, White said: "Well, naturally I think I will win, or I would not have come over, but I am not making any boast. I have never been beaten and should the fight with Britt be my first defeat, I only hope there will be no question about it."

Mitchell has announced that he and White will leave here for Frisco on Wednesday morning and will immediately look around for training quarters.

Mitchell wanted to Jimmy Coffroth to-day for the definite date for the Britt-White encounter, but further than that it will be during the last week in April, he is not yet informed.

GREAT BATTLE IS ASSURED. Manager Coffroth says the Contest Will Take Place Next Month.

According to Manager Jimmy Coffroth of the Yosemite Club, the great battle between Britt and White will take place in this city next month.

The permit has not yet been granted, but Coffroth seems sanguine of success and yesterday he paid the license collector \$1200 for the license of the club.

Jimmy Britt's heart was filled with joy when he heard that White was on American soil. James immediately telegraphed to a telegraph office and sent a wire of congratulation to the English champion.

White is a boxer worthy of his steel and a hard man to beat. Tim McGrath announced yesterday that he would probably train White for his battle with Britt.
