

DR. ROENTGEN TOO SHY TO FACE THROG... "Nan" Patterson's Fate Is to Be Committed to the Twelve Jurors To-Day... RAND'S CLOSING WORDS... Prosecutor Grills the Fair Defendant and Scores the Opposing Counsel

NEW YORK, May 2.—The fate of "Nan" Patterson in her third trial for the murder of "Caesar" Young will be in the hands of the jury early to-morrow. Assistant District Attorney Rand completed the closing argument for the prosecution shortly before 5 o'clock this afternoon, and the court adjourned for the day. Recorder Goff announced that he would charge the jury on the opening of court to-morrow. It is believed that his instructions will not be lengthy, and probably before the noon hour the jury will have retired to consider a verdict.

At the close of the argument to-day, after the prosecutor had arraigned her in the most scathing terms; had asserted that her silence in this trial was a confession of her guilt; had declared that her sister had lied on the stand and that her counsel had made his plea for her life on a foundation of fabrications, "Nan" Patterson said she still felt confident the jury would bring in an early verdict of acquittal.

DR. ROENTGEN WHO WAS KEPT AWAY BY RHYTHM FROM CONFERENCE OF ADMIRERS... BERLIN, May 2.—Professor Roentgen is too shy to attend the international congress called to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the discovery of the Roentgen ray and to collate the latest applications and developments. The congress opened here on April 29 and the professor promised to be present, but in spite of this, and although his name was on the programme, he said he simply could not attend the sessions as it would be impossible for him to face the crowd which had gathered to glorify his work.
