IMPORTANT RULING ON MINING CLAIMS

Discovery of Mineral Necessary to Validity in Alaska, Says Judge.

TACOMA, July 18.—An important decision affecting the mining interests of Alaska has been rendered by Judge Wickensham at Fairbanks. Miners there believe it will do more toward the development of the resources of that country than anything else which has occurred within recent years.

Discovery of mineral is necessary to the validity of a claim. It is stated and recorded shall follow after the date of the discovery they relate back to the discovery, and in case no mineral rights have attached, perfect the claim as of that date.

LIGHT THROWN UPON TRAGEDY

Mrs. Hueter Confesses to an Intimacy Between Herself and a Young Physician

INQUIRY TO PROCEED

Her Husband Known to Have Been Aware of Her Actions on the Day of the Shooting

SAN JOSE, July 18.—Mrs. Kate Hueter, who is being held pending an investigation into the death of her husband, Gustav Hueter, has confessed to Sheriff Ross that for the past six months she was unfaithful. She names a young physician as the person with whom she consorted. This is now believed to have been the cause of the quarrel between the couple which had such a tragic ending.

DEPOSED MONARCH FAVORS THE PLAN

British Court Circles Hold That, Under the Proposed Settlement, the Scandinavian Crisis Would Pass

LONDON, July 18.—It is stated in court circles here that arrangements have been perfected for placing Prince Charles of Denmark on the Norwegian throne. It is explained that King Oscar has no intention of permitting a Swedish Prince to accept the position, but has signified his willingness that King Christian should sanction Prince Charles' acceptance. It is further explained that this policy commended itself to both King Oscar and King Christian, inasmuch as they are agreed that otherwise Norway might either become a republic or choose a sovereign less likely to be devoted strictly to Scandinavian interests.

WOMEN GOES TO CIGARES

Arrangements Perfected for Placing the Danish Prince on the Throne of Which King Oscar Was Deprived

CHICAGO, July 18.—The Daily News says: "That the independent Norwegian Government is prepared to ask for official recognition from the United States and that special envoys have been in the ground as private citizens prior to the assumption of diplomatic powers with which they have been invested, developed to-day upon the return from New York of E. Hermann Gade, Mayor of Lake Park, Ill. Mayor Gade was the Norwegian ambassador in London and secretary of the Norwegian-Swedish commission that treated and dealt with the consular question. The conference included Christian Hauege, who up to the time of his resignation was ambassador in London, and John W. Foster, an informal document was drawn up for presentation to the State Department to serve as a 'feeler' for the official document which may be expected to follow.

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The trial came to a sudden and unexpected close to-day when the counsel for the defense announced their intention to submit the case without argument. District Attorney Heney, who had concluded his argument to the jury, consented to this arrangement and the case went to the jury.

Judge de Haven's charge to the jury was brief, but comprehensive. The Judge held that it was not necessary to show that a conspiracy had been formed, but that if it failed the defendants might be guilty of the crime. Neither was it necessary to show any agreement. In short, the idea he conveyed was that if Williamson, Gessner and Biggs advanced money with the idea that the lands after they came to patent were to belong to the firm of Williamson & Gessner, there was a conspiracy. If, on the other hand, there was a reasonable doubt on this point, then there should be no conviction. He also stated that there must be two of the defendants, but not necessarily all three, connected with the crime or no conspiracy could exist.

At the conclusion of Judge de Haven's charge the jury at 3:15 o'clock retired to deliberate. In his argument Heney went over the details of what, in the theory of the Government, goes to constitute a conspiracy. On the part of a Representative in Congress, a Commissioner of the United States and a physician and a man of prominence in his community to suborn a small host of illegal entrants to perjure themselves that they might acquire title by unlawful methods to large tracts of the public domain and add to their sheep range in Crook County.

Judge Bennett, for the defense, exploded a bombshell when, upon reconvening of court to hear the argument of the defense, he arose and announced that the defense had concluded to submit the case without argument. Judge de Haven asked District Attorney Heney if he was willing to allow the case to go to the jury without further argument and the Government's attorney said that he was.








