To accomplish this it required fifty square inches of skin. This was furnished by five members of the tribe, G. H. H. J. Tallari, F. Buehler, C. P. Peterson, and G. Hallem, each contributing ten inches of skin from the left arm. The operation was a perfect success, and in a short time Fisher was able to get up on his feet and to leave the hospital.
