#### Writes to Rhinock Tells Congressman That His Intentions in the Affair Were Not Malicious

COVINGTON, Ky., Aug. 6.—Congressman Rhinock made known to-night the name of the person who furnished Robert W. Criswell, editor of the New Yorker, with the information regarding Alice Roosevelt's visit to the Lantana race track, where she was introduced to Rhinock. It was Criswell's close friend, George Mortimer Roe, who now lives in California. He wrote Rhinock from Los Angeles, admitting the authorship of the information. Rhinock will turn over the letter to the New York authorities. Criswell committed suicide last Thursday night in New York by leaping in front of a subway train.

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## YOUNG MAN KILLS HIMSELF DURING FIT OF INSANITY

### Richard Cady of San Diego Blows Off the Top of His Head With a Shotgun

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 6.—During a fit of temporary insanity, yesterday afternoon Richard Cady, 24 years of age, killed himself on his father's ranch near Alpine by blowing off the top of his head with a shotgun. A short time after the headless body was found by the mother of the young man. For some time past young Cady has been subject to temporary attacks of insanity, and only recently he ran away from his home in this city and was located only after much difficulty. In the hope of improving his health his mother took him out to the ranch a short time ago and he seemed to grow slightly better.

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## UNION LABOR MEN OPPOSED TO ABE RUEF

## EMINENT DIVINE URGES BROOMS FOR CLEANING CITY HALL.

### Dr. I. C. Meserve Calls Upon Citizens to Go to Primaries and Vote Right.

The Rev. I. C. Meserve, D. D., pastor of Plymouth Congregational Church, last night made urgent reference to the need of casting votes for strong and good officials for San Francisco, and said it would be nothing short of criminal to neglect to vote at the primary. His remarks were made from the pulpit.

"Choose reliable men to nominate reliable men," he advised. "From all of us chosen to office because they seek it, or because they practically buy it, by promises of patronage if not with cash. Men should not be chosen to office because they are decided by a party convention to be available. Even good men are not always equal to new responsibilities nor proof against new temptations."

Choose reliable men to nominate reliable men, and then choose your best judgment in voting for them. In no other way can we change the present disgraceful and most dangerous condition of things, in which politics is spelled graft.

To be ruled by incompetents, by managers of a business that seeks for profit alone, not minding the cost to the citizen, is a disgrace to a city that language of the utterly degrading, doesn't care a hang for the fact that actual, and from all that we see to be possible, let us now free ourselves in fair San Francisco.

There is need of a broom brigade in the City Hall. Sweeping is not for it a simply common knowledge that such is the case. Another administration will be more creditable to the city as this than the one now in power. It is time that men were chosen to office because they are every way the best men for the job. 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## RAY OF HOPE OF BENNINGTON

### Sailor in the Hospital at San Diego Sinking With Small Chance of Recovery

#### COURT TO RECONVENE

### Injured Men Will Be Brought North to Be Operated on at Mare Island Navy Yard

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 6.—The cheerfulness that has been apparent about the temporary hospital at the Government barracks was changed to-day, when it was rumored about the wardroom and elsewhere that the death roll of the Bennington was likely to be increased to sixty-six. Frederick A. Mueller, one of the more seriously injured of the sailors, is rapidly sinking. Mueller is a native of Denmark, and has been a member of the navy for many years. His last enlistment was at San Francisco. He has no relatives, as far as is known here, and his enlistment papers show "No relatives." He is between 41 and 44 years of age. It is said he may live, but chances are as present on the other side.

The sessions of the court of inquiry are to be renewed to-morrow morning, and it is promised that they will be concluded before the close of the week. As soon as the report of the court is completed the Chicago and the Bennington will leave for Mare Island, the former towing the latter.

The wounded are to be sent north to Mare Island Hospital, but whether they will go by train or by vessel has yet to be determined. The necessity for the change arises from the fact that skin-grafting must be resorted to in a number of cases, and the present improvised hospital is not the best for such an operation. Mare Island hospital is fitted properly for such work. While not all of the injured will require this treatment a number will, and will be taken north.

Orders have been issued for the Boston, now at Fugate Sound, to proceed to Panama to relieve the Princeton. This is the work that the Bennington was expected to do.

## GAS KILLS GIRL WHO WAS SOON TO MARRY

### LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—To the deadly combination of an instantaneous gas heater and a small unventilated room is ascribed the death of Miss Grace Murray at the Cain, Second and Olive streets, on Saturday night. Autopsy Surgeon Campbell to-day made an examination of the remains of the young woman, who was soon to be happily wedded, and found unmistakable evidences of gas poisoning. With the passing of Miss Murray the gas heater and the unventilated cubbyhole bathroom have claimed eight lives in less than two years in Los Angeles.

Miss Murray was a beautiful girl, aged 22 years. She had been employed as stenographer by a wholesale house for two years. Her father, a Mr. Murray, was to become the bride of F. W. Whittaker of the freight department of the Southern Pacific. Saturday night she went to the bathroom to wash her hair, and an hour later was found dead on the floor.

## SHIP BENJAMIN F. PACKARD MAKES PORT AT SAN DIEGO
