CO-SHOCKHOLDER IN COMPANY SAYS HE WAS DECEASED

F. D. Greany Obtains Warrant for Arrest of President of the G. W. Reynolds Company.

F. D. Greany, a guest at the Russ House, obtained a warrant from Police Judge Conlan yesterday for the arrest of Charles A. Raubut on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Raubut is president of the G. W. Reynolds Company, muslin underwear manufacturers, Second and Mission streets.

Greany came here from Honolulu about a year ago and alleges in the complaint that he was induced to invest \$2000 in the company's stock by Raubut on the representations that Raubut had invested \$20,000 cash and K. H. Vesper \$5000 cash in the company, which was his working capital; that there was a surplus of \$2000 over the indebtedness; that the merchandise liabilities were not in excess of \$5000 and were fully balanced by accounts receivable and that the stock in hand was worth over \$30,000.

Greany alleged that all of these representations were false, which he learned after he had been appointed bookkeeper for the company. He says he has repeatedly made a demand upon Raubut for the return of the \$2000, but without success. He makes other charges against Raubut, which he says he will be able to prove when the case comes on for trial.

Case of Mrs. Sather Continued.
The case of H. R. Howk against Mrs. Jane K. Sather has again been postponed by Court Commissioner H. L. Jochimsen to August 29. The contest grew out of refusal of Mrs. Sather to assume the payment of \$40,000 to Howk, which was a verbal contract made when he left New York and came here to be her protector and financial agent.

PRIOR'S ESTATE RUNS UP INTO THE MILLIONS
Deceased Pioneer Was Largely Invested in Realty and Kept Large Amount of Cash on Hand.

The inventory and appraisal of the estate of the late James K. Prior was filed yesterday and a valuation of \$2,202,152.66 was placed upon the property of the departed pioneer. The amount of cash kept on hand by Prior was unusually large, even for a millionaire, the sum deposited in various banks amounting to \$272,890.71. Real estate constitutes the largest part of the estate, the following properties being inventoried:

Northwest corner of Mason and Eddy streets, \$180,000; southwest corner of Mason and Eddy streets, with improvements known as the Tivoli Theater, \$61,250; two pieces of property on Market street, near Marshall square, valued respectively at \$100,000 and \$250,000; improved property at 1020 Market street, \$250,250; improved property on Guercio street, near Twenty-fifth, valued respectively at \$7500 and \$21,800; a piece at Perry and Fourth streets, \$52,000; a piece at Sixteenth and Clement street, \$30,400; the Greening ranch in Napa County, valued at \$50,000, and the Fair Oaks, San Mateo county, valued at \$52,170.

The balance of the estate is composed of stocks, including \$79,000 in the Springs Valley Water Company, small real estate holdings in this city, Alameda County and San Jose and personal effects.

Found Dead in Bath Tub.
Henry Quoyrel, of 33 Van Ness avenue was found dead in his bath tub at the Lick baths, Tenth and Howard streets, last night. The tub was full of water. It is supposed Quoyrel was drowned with heart trouble.
