WILL GO TO CORINTO



FALL BUSINESS IS VERY HEAVY

Distribution of Autumn Merchandise in Progress Unusually Early This Year

WEEK'S TRADE REVIEWS

Confidence in Future Prospects Is Gratifying Feature of All the Reports

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Dun's weekly review of trade to-morrow will say: Distribution of autumn merchandise is in progress unusually early this year, and the volume of forward business is so heavy that the last half of 1905 probably will establish a remarkable record of commercial activity. Current retail trade is well maintained. Special reports regarding manufacturing conditions have been received from about forty leading industrial centers and there is surprising unanimity in the statements. With scarcely an exception plants are working close to full capacity with little idle machinery except where alterations or improvements are in progress and contracts on hand far exceed those held at this date in 1904. Equally gratifying is the confidence expressed in the future, a prominent feature of most reports. Encouraging crop prospects provide a large factor in the good feeling. Railway earnings in the first half of August surpass last year's by 5.3 per cent.

Recent conditions in hides and leather are accentuated and it is evidently the policy of stocking interests to sustain hides at the best position while neglecting leather. Failures this week numbered 190 in the United States, against 150 last year, and 27 in Canada, against 30 a year ago. Bradstreet's to-morrow will say: August, a period of exceptional activity in all lines of trade and industry, draws to a close with buying showing further expansion, cereal crop yields or prospects, close to the best, railway tonnage increasing, collections in the West, North and East reported generally better, money exceptionally easy for this season, notwithstanding increased crop moving requirements and confidence on all hands of a large and prospectively profitable fall and winter trade. Reports are of a better demand for Territory wools.

Gross railway earnings point to enlarged traffic compared with the expanding earnings noted a year ago in August. Business failures for the week ending August 24 in the United States number 176, against 147 last week and 185 last year. In Canada failures for the week number 14, against 28 last week and 25 last year. Wheat, including flour, exports for the week ending August 24 are 1,170,340 bushels, against 1,085,519 bushels last week, 1,084,352 last year. From July 1 to date the exports are 7,477,594 bushels, against 10,634,151 last year.

SYNDICATE BUYS BIG COAL FIELDS

Purchases Thirty Thousand Acres on One of Queen Charlotte Islands.

Bolland, representing a syndicate of New York and Montreal capitalists, to-day closed one of the biggest coal mining deals which has taken place in the West for years, acquiring 30,000 acres of coal land on one of the Queen Charlotte Islands. She No Longer Eligible to Be His Wife, Is Experience of 18-Year-Old Blanch Taylor in the Last Twenty-Four Hours

JAILED BUT RELEASED

Wedding Takes Place Despite the Fact That Both Had Been Promised Elsewhere

SEATTLE, Aug. 25.—Eloping with her sister's fiance, arrested with him as she stepped from the boat at Vancouver, B. C., on telegraphic instructions from her father, released after spending the night in jail, married and then telegraphing her own fiance at Los Angeles that she no longer eligible to be his wife, is the experience of 18-year-old Blanch Taylor in the last twenty-four hours. She is the daughter of J. M. Taylor, a retired merchant of Seattle, residing in an elegant home on Harvard avenue. The girl's husband, Raleigh Faulkner, has been a waiter in the Grand Union restaurant. He was engaged to May Taylor, an elder sister of Blanch, and the wedding day was set for next month. Blanch was engaged to Harry Raymond of Los Angeles.

Neither Mr. nor Mrs. Taylor nor their daughter May suspected that Faulkner had transferred his affections to Blanch until the elopement. Taylor at once wired to Vancouver to release the couple. After word had been received that the lovers were locked up, May pleaded with her father for their release and permission to marry. Taylor relented and wired Vancouver to release the pair and in an hour they were married.

An examination showed that Studzinski had been hit on the head by a blunt instrument and probably instantly killed. A trunk and suitcase were standing open and their contents stolen.

The crime was discovered this morning when a friend went to the place to deliver Studzinski's mail. Being unable to open the door, and getting no response, he looked through the window and saw the body lying on the floor. An examination showed that Studzinski had been hit on the head by a blunt instrument and probably instantly killed. A trunk and suitcase were standing open and their contents stolen.
