"PAOLO AND FRANCESCA" PLAYERS NAMED

Buildings Destroyed by Fire Will at Once Be Replaced by Modern Manufactories

AGED WOMAN LOSES ALL

Total Loss Is Not So Great as Was at First Estimated, but Insurance Is Small

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MILITARY WORK NOT ENTICING. Extra Inducements Offered Students at the University to Continue Drill

OAKLAND, Sept. 20.—County Auditor Bacon must pay the demands of the Ransome Construction Company for its work done on the scenic boulevard, now under construction between this city and Hayward, according to a decision rendered by Judge Waste to-day.

This boulevard, as planned, is to cost \$300,000 and the Ransome Construction Company was given the contract to perform the work. It is to receive certain monthly payments.

Judge Waste, in a lengthy decision, goes to the foundation of the entire matter and discusses every phase of the case. He comes to the conclusion that the Board of Supervisors has a right to spend the money for this purpose and that its action cannot be interfered with.

Wheatland is a graduate of Harvard and at one time was a member of the most exclusive Eastern clubs. He had a large income, but ran through it all.












Wheatland's decision to stay in the County Jail was not objected to by his friends and advisers. It is thought that the young man is taking the only safe course that would be effective in his life.
