AUTO WRECKED ON CAMPUS

In Gallantly Saving Young Woman From Injury Student Party Is Upset and Bruised.

ESCAPE FROM DEATH IS VERY REMARKABLE

OAKLAND, Sept. 21.—Leaving the question of her guilt or innocence an open one, a coroner's jury this evening, in the case of Manuel F. Vencelau, who was shot by his wife Monday afternoon, brought in the following verdict: "We, the jury, find that Manuel F. Vencelau, a native of the Azores Islands, came to his death by reason of a gunshot wound through the intestines inflicted by his wife." She was not present at the inquest, and no attempt was made to take testimony as to what was understood that Attorney A. L. Frick, who will defend her, would have advised her to make no statement.

JURORS DO NOT ACCUSE WOMAN

There were no new developments brought to light. Dr. O. D. Hamlin testified as to the nature of the wounds. Policemen John Cox and H. E. E. Green told of going to the house and the finding of Vencelau with a wound in the abdomen.

The groom is Peter Schmidt, one of Russian River Valley's wealthiest fruit-growers and property owners. He has attained the ripe old age of 80 years. LIVERMORE, Sept. 21.—George Cronin was held to answer to-day for trial in the Superior Court on a charge of robbery. Percy Calvin accusing Cronin of holding him up last week and taking a gold watch. Bail was fixed at \$300. Cronin is suspected of being a firebug and responsible for half a dozen incendiary fires that have occurred recently at Livermore.
