

## CHARGED WITH USING MAILS TO DEFRAUD

Secretary and Manager of Investment Company Arrested at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 23.—L. H. Miles, financial secretary of the St. Louis branch of the St. Joseph Tontine Investment Company, and W. L. Miles, formerly general manager, were arrested here last night and will be taken to St. Joseph tonight to stand trial on charges of having used the mails to defraud.

The investment company's offices at Kansas City were closed on April 10 last and tacked on the door was a placard reading:

Indictments were returned against them Thursday in the Federal court at St. Joseph.

## FOOTPADS OPEN FIRE ON AN AUTOMOBILE

Attempt to Hold Up Occupants of Motor Car Is Frustrated.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—Springing from the scrub oaks which flank both sides of the road, two masked bandits attempted to hold up an automobile last night at the foot of Hubbard's Hill in Wisconsin. The road at this point is lonely and there are no houses within a mile. The automobilists, among whom there were two women and a little girl, refused to stop and the bandits fired ten shots at the speeding car, but failed to hit either the machine or its occupants.

The driver of the machine, H. Holbarth of Waukegan, was accompanied by his wife and Mrs. Cecil Yates and her 10-year-old daughter. Mrs. Holbarth ran the machine into Glenwood at full speed, regardless of the ordinances and reported the attempted hold-up to the police. Two policemen were sent to the scene, but failed to find any trace of the bandits.

The court is now free to proceed with the trial of Ensign Clarence Landran of the Lawton, who is to be tried for absence from his ship without leave and also for disrespect to a superior officer. The case of Landran will come up for trial on Wednesday morning, Judge Advocate West prosecuting.

## BANK OFFICIALS ARE INDICTED

Men Responsible for Wrecking Missouri Institution Are in Hands of the Law

CLINTON, Mo., Sept. 23.—The Grand Jury which has been investigating the failure of the Salmon & Salmon Bank at Clinton to-day returned indictments on thirteen counts against Thomas M. Casey, ex-manager of the bank, who confessed at the time of the failure to using forged notes for securities. Major Harvey W. Salmon and Dr. G. Y. Salmon, also officers of the bank, were indicted on six counts each, and F. M. Salmon, the former clerk of the bank, was indicted on four counts.

The Salmons for many years have been among the most prominent men in Missouri. Few Democrats in the State are better known than Major Harvey W. Salmon. He came to Clinton in 1866 and has since then been connected with the banking business. He was prominent in State politics. He was elected State Treasurer in 1872 and Democratic ticket in 1872 and served in that office until 1874. He formerly was a member of the Democratic State Central Committee, and in 1892, as chairman of the State Executive Committee, took charge of the campaign of William J. Stone, when the latter ran for Governor. Later he was himself spoken of as a candidate for the Governorship. Dr. Salmon, who is nearly 60 years of age, has not been actively connected with the bank for many years.

The bank of Salmon & Salmon, which was one of the oldest and considered for many years one of the strongest in the State, failed on June 21 last. The institution was owned by Major Salmon and his brother, Dr. G. Y. Salmon. The failure caused a sensation, which increased when later it became known that Cashier Casey, who is Dr. Salmon's son-in-law and who practically had charge of the bank, had confessed to having forged securities amounting to upward of \$100,000.

Though the bank had deposits of about \$65,000 and its loans amounted to \$654,000, but \$600 were found in the institution's vaults.

Many farmers and others who had explicit confidence in the bank lost practically all they possessed. On August 31, following a meeting of depositors, Frank M. Salmon, son of Dr. G. Y. Salmon, was formally charged with receiving deposits when the bank was in an insolvent condition.

**SALOON BISHOP POTTER WOUND IS CONDEMNED**  
Plank in W. C. T. U. Platform Is Devoted to Denunciation of Subway Taverns, That Was.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—One plank in the platform adopted yesterday by the twenty-second annual convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Kings County is devoted to a condemnation of the subway tavern, that was.

The subway tavern, it reads, "has now revealed its true character—that of a common saloon—its caretaker having confessed that its aim was to secure as habits the respectable inhabitants of the residential section of the city."

"We protest against the establishment of such traps for the unwary and the countenancing of such devices of Satan by Christians and we will labor against such places equally as against the less hypocritical saloon."

## MODERATES WIN CUBAN ELECTION

Liberals Admit Victory in Havana of Party Supporting President Palma

FEW ROWS AT POLLS

One Man Fatally Shot and Another Hurt With a Rock Total of Day's Casualties

HAVANA, Sept. 23.—The election for members of the Board of Registration in Havana passed off quietly and telegrams from the interior say there were no disorders except at Placetas in the province of Santa Clara, where many shots were fired, but no one was killed.

The Liberals admit the complete victory in Havana of the Moderates, the party of President Palma. They claim that they did not vote because Moderate policemen stationed at the polls prevented them from doing so. A reporter visited a majority of the polls here, but at none of them noted any indication of restraint upon voters. Good order is being maintained throughout the city and with the exception of a man being shot and probably fatally injured in a row to-night and another being seriously hurt on the head by a rock there has been no trouble.

Crowds which gathered in the Liberal club rooms were dismissed by orators, who informed them that the Moderates were victorious and requested the Liberals to retire to their homes. The Liberal Club was closed and barricaded. A number of Liberals say that this was done because they had received word that the Government intended to search the place for arms.

## KNOWN IN NEW YORK.

Slain Liberal Once Resided in the Empire City.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—Colonel Enrique Villeundas, leader of the Cuban Liberal party, who was killed yesterday in Cienfuegos, had many friends in this city, who to his credit, were some time during the Cuban revolutions. The Congressman's father and fourteen-year-old sister, Esmeralda, are staying at the home of Juan Fonseca, in West Sixty-sixth street. The elder Villeundas has been ill, and the news of his son's tragic death was withheld from him last night. He intended to leave this city to-day with his daughter for Havana on the steamer Morro Castle, but could not get away.

Colonel Villeundas was 33 years old. He fought with distinction in the last revolution against Spain, serving under General Maximo Gomez. He went to Cuba at the time of the insurrection in an allubustering expedition from the United States, led by General Juan Ruse. A brother of Colonel Villeundas was killed in the revolution. Another brother is a member from Santiago Province in the lower house of Congress. Colonel Villeundas represented a Havana district. He was described as an able lawyer and a forcible speaker and often addressed the Cuban party in this city at the time of the revolution.

## PLOT IS DISCOVERED.

Congressman Villeundas Carried Bombs to Cienfuegos.

HAVANA, Sept. 23.—The Government claims to have discovered a Liberal plot to dynamite the city hall, courthouse and other public buildings of Cienfuegos. An expert in Cienfuegos examined one of the bombs found in Congressman Villeundas' room declares it contained enough explosives to blow up an entire block. The Government has evidence showing Villeundas took twelve bombs to Cienfuegos, only three of which have been discovered, though Liberals have been arrested and found to have a number of bomb fuses. At Santa Clara a search has revealed eleven bombs similar to the others found and also a small number of rifles and some ammunition secreted near the city.

## KANSAS TO CELEBRATE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

Monster World's Fair Is Planned by Prominent Citizens of the Soudanese State.

TOPEKA, Kans., Sept. 23.—A monster world's fair and celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the admission of the State of Kansas to the Union was planned here last night by the Commercial Club of Topeka, assisted by several prominent men from different parts of the State, among them Governor E. W. Hoch of Marion and T. M. Potter of Peabody. It is to be entirely a Kansas institution, managed by a committee of fifteen prominent men appointed from different parts of Kansas.

## FRENCH THIEF IN HARD LUCK

Love for Paris, Scene of His Crimes, Leads Him Back to Toils From Which He Fleed

PARIS, Sept. 23.—If Joseph Sporn had not yielded to that craving heret in all Frenchmen to return to the land of their birth he would not now be awaiting shipment with the next batch of convicts to the penal settlement in French Guiana. And thereby hangs a tale as romantic as any related in criminal fiction.

Nine years ago Sporn was sentenced to eight years' hard labor and twenty years' exile for burglary. He was transported to French Guiana to serve out the first part of his sentence. A year after his arrival it chanced that he was set to work cutting rushes by the river side. Some convicts had murdered a sailor a few days before and thrown the body into the water. While Sporn was hacking away at the rushes he spied the corpse floating downstream. He had had no hand in the murder, but his quick wit saw a brilliant opportunity to profit by it. His work had carried him to a point where he was screened from observation by any of the prison guards. He swam out into the stream and brought the body ashore. Then he dressed himself in the clothing of the dead sailor and transferred his own convict garb to the corpse.

Setting the latter adrift again he made tracks toward the mouth of the river. He had been running for several hours when fortune again befriended him. He saw a small Dutch steamer nearby and managed to attract her attention. A boat put off and he was taken aboard. His nautical rig and his ability to talk German—for which he was indebted to his Alsatian birth—lent credence to Sporn because of the Dutch skipper that he was a shipwrecked sailor and he was given passage to Dutch Guiana.

From there he made his way to Venezuela, where for a time he obtained employment in a corgeryman's household. He saved some money in this situation and with it set up a stationer's shop under an assumed name, of course, and prospered. Meanwhile his name had been written off the French prison books as "drowned" and he had been officially buried. This was due to the discovery of the murdered sailor's body some days after Sporn's flight and its identification as Sporn because of the convict's clothing. No better chance of retaining his freedom and turning over a new leaf.

His only danger lay in returning to his old haunts, where he might be recognized. But that was the one temptation that he could not resist. The longing for Paris was too strong for him. He sold out his business and sailed for Europe. After a brief period spent in Marseilles he made his way to Paris. So far as is known he has lived an honest life after his escape up to that time. But old associations revived his criminal instincts. He opened a shop in the Rue Levis under the name of Andrieu and took to stealing in stolen goods.

arrested Sporn nine years before and he had an excellent memory for faces. A comparison of finger prints settled the escaped convict's fate. In a few days he will be on his way to French Guiana to serve out the remainder of his original sentence. And when he has finished that he will have to begin on a new one.

## NET EARNINGS SHOW GAIN OF \$1,098,352

Interborough Rapid Transit Company of New York Issues Annual Report.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—The annual report of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which operates the subway and the Manhattan Elevated lines in this city, was issued to-day. The report is for the year ending June 30, at which time the subway had been in operation for eight months and five days. The net earnings for the year were \$2,439,386, an increase of \$1,098,352, as compared with last year, when only the elevated lines were operated.

After payment of \$2,352,500 in dividends on Interborough stock and the guaranteed dividend on Manhattan Elevated stock, amounting to \$3,564,000, there remained a surplus for the year of \$57,421, a decrease of \$1,163,305, as compared with 1904.
