

# ATTORNEY H. A. KROUSE PUNISHED BY GRAHAM

Attorney H. A. Krouse, the alleged counsel for Mrs. Charlotte Newman Collins, was yesterday found guilty of contempt of court by Judge Graham after a stormy session on the maintenance suit. A writ of prohibition restraining Judge Graham from proceeding in the case was denied by the Supreme Court. The perjury charge against George D. Collins, before Judge Thomas J. Lennon, is moving slowly, as Collins is grasping at every technicality that will give him even a momentary delay.

**Pretended Counsel of Mrs. Collins in Contempt. Asserts Court Acts Arbitrarily in Case.**

**Time of Judiciary Is Taken Up by Returned Refugee.**

H. A. Krouse, the self-constituted attorney of Mrs. Charlotte Newman Collins, and accused agent of George D. Collins, was found guilty of contempt of court by Judge Graham yesterday. He was fined \$100 with the alternative of five days' imprisonment. Krouse chose the latter and spent the night in the County Jail.

Collins waded further into a maze of technicalities before Judge Lennon in his attempt to have the indictment against him set aside or quashed. A writ of prohibition to restrain Judge Graham from further action in Mrs. Newman Collins' suit for maintenance was denied by the Supreme Court. It seemed that the accused bigamist was monopolizing the entire judicial system yesterday.

The session in Judge Graham's court was a stormy one. Mrs. Collins denied that Krouse was her attorney and declared that if she signed a substitution making him such she was deceived. It was in his desperate endeavor to prevent these facts being brought out that Krouse committed the offense of contempt of court.

Judge Graham warned Krouse, but the man who "butted into" the case was snarling under some stinging thrusts from Attorney Hiram Johnson. Moreover, Krouse was evidently desperate lest his dealings with Mrs. Collins should be brought out. When the court insisted upon the whole truth Krouse characterized the action as being arbitrary. Judge Graham acted quickly, finding him guilty and imposing a fine of \$100 or five days in the County Jail.

A mysterious phase of the case is the disappearance of an affidavit and the order of substitution. They were in the possession of the clerk of Judge Graham's court, W. E. Price. He left them on his desk last Tuesday afternoon. When he returned they were gone.

Krouse had a bad day all around. He was not in the least moved by the scolding and rebuffs he received. He remarked with a grin that he would go to jail, as it was cheaper than paying the fine.

**KROUSE GIVEN SNUBBING.** When he entered the court he walked up to Mrs. Newman Collins who was sitting in the rear with her brother, W. H. Newman. He attempted to speak to her, but she turned aside. "This is my brother," she said, indicating Newman. Krouse extended his hand. Newman stuck his hand behind his back and stepped aside. Krouse extended him a card, saying, "I am your sister's attorney."

"I do not care to talk to you. I do not want to know you," retorted Newman. Krouse then walked forward to indulge in the disastrous contest of intellect with Hiram Johnson. It was a war, and a noisy one from start to finish. Attorney Louis Boardman, appearing openly for Collins, gave the affair the aspect of a three-cornered fight.

Boardman moved that action on the citation for Collins to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt of court be deferred until the Supreme Court was heard from alleging that he was Mrs. Collins' attorney. Krouse objected. Then Hiram Johnson opened his artillery upon Krouse.

"The early part of the week," he said, "I presented a communication, which is of more vital interest to this court than the matter before it now. It is for this court to determine whether that party pretends to represent one side of the case and really represents the other."

resents the other. I charge that no practitioner is guilty of tactics that no citizen should employ." "Those are not the facts," retorted Krouse. "From your own mouth," retorted Johnson, "comes the assertion that you are acting not for Charlotte Newman Collins, but for George D. Collins. It is immaterial to me whether or not I appear in this case. But I do not propose that any fraud shall be perpetrated on this unfortunate woman by George D. Collins. I bring it to your Honor because it concerns you more than any one else. Collins shall not select attorneys for himself and Charlotte Newman."

**MR. BOARDMAN BUTTS IN.** "That refers to a field where I am concerned," cried Attorney Boardman, and all three sides began talking at once. Judge Graham sternly silenced them. "I accuse Mr. Johnson of deliberately betraying his client and selling out," said Krouse. This damaging accusation caused some tittering. Attorney Johnson brushed aside the statement by Krouse, Mrs. Collins was ordered to take the stand. The unfortunate woman wore the look of a frightened animal and in her bewilderment could scarcely speak above a whisper.

"Has George D. Collins ever contributed anything to your support since June?" inquired Judge Graham. "No, sir," replied Mrs. Collins. "Did you ever employ Mr. Krouse as your attorney?" "Who is your attorney?" "Mr. Johnson." "What was said to you by Mr. Krouse when he approached you about the case?" "He told me that he would get me some money."

"How about that remark concerning honest men?" interposed Attorney Johnson. "Never mind about honest men," said Krouse.

"I saw you talking earnestly with Collins in Department 11," retorted Johnson. "I suggest that another name be added to the list of Collins' attorneys—the name of Krouse."

"What else did Mr. Krouse say?" asked Judge Graham. "Her counsel advises her not to answer that question," interposed Krouse. "What counsel?" asked Johnson. "I," replied Krouse.

"Ah!" smiled Johnson. "Tell me all that Mr. Krouse said," insisted the court. "He told me that he would get me some money if I would substitute another attorney," said Mrs. Collins. "He gave me an affidavit and said that if I would sign it he would go to Judge Graham's court and get the money."

**TELLS OF PROMISE MADE.** "He said that he knew where he could get it. I asked him why Mr. Johnson could not get it. He said that Mr. Johnson was an enemy of Mr. Collins. Mr. Krouse said that if I would sign the affidavit he would get the money for me."

"Did he say anything about substituting himself as your attorney?" asked the court. "No, sir; he didn't tell me anything about substituting attorneys."

At this point Krouse became noisy and Judge Graham warned him that he was bordering closely on contempt. Krouse made the offensive remark that the court was acting arbitrarily.

"You did not know what you were signing when you signed an order of substitution?" resumed the court. "No, sir. Mr. Krouse said that he could get me some money and I needed it badly. I told him that I thought he was playing a trick."

# TWO STORIES ABOUT FIRING OF ROCKETS

**Captain James of Defiance Says Captain Badger of Chicago Asked Him "Is That Point Arena Light?"**

**CRAFT SPEAK EACH OTHER IN THE FOG**

**Officer in Charge of War Vessel Says Red Glare Led Him to Believe There Was Wreck Near the Shore**

A wireless message was received by the United States Lighthouse Board in this city on Thursday from the cruiser Chicago, off Point Reyes, saying that what looked like signals of distress had been seen in the vicinity of that headland on Wednesday night. Rear Admiral Goodrich, who sent the message, suggested that a lighthouse tender investigate.

Captain Dan James, bound south from Eureka, on the tug Defiance, passed the Chicago off Point Reyes and when he arrived here reported that the flagship was sending up rockets. He ran in close to the war vessel and somebody on the bridge hailed him and inquired: "Is that Point Arena light?" It was somewhat thick at the time and the Chicago had lost her bearings and was shooting rockets for the purpose of attracting the attention of somebody who could tell her where she was. Captain C. J. Badger, who recently succeeded Captain Moore as commander of the Chicago, said yesterday: "I was on the shore I saw what I took to be the flare of a rocket. It might have been that the fog, which was rather thick, had distorted the glare of a fire on the foreshore. When one of my officers reported that he thought he also had seen something that looked like a fire or a rocket I reported the matter to Admiral Goodrich. The admiral decided that it would not be advisable to take a large vessel like the Chicago further inshore in such thick weather and gave orders for the sending of the message, which I see was safely received."

Captain Badger says further that the Chicago was touched off in response to what were believed to be signals of distress. He deplores that the Chicago was lost. "I did hail Captain James and informed him that the light on shore was at Point Arena. I might have been a little ambiguous and it is possible that I conveyed the information in the form of a question. But the hailing was for his benefit, not ours. We knew where we were all the time."

Captain Moore, who formerly commanded the Chicago, has gone to Washington for duty on the examining board. Captain Badger's last command was the cruiser Newark and later he was commander of the Chicago at Annapolis. The Chicago will remain in port about a month, when she will make a cruise to Honolulu.
